Rejection of Sin, Not Sinners**

Our rejection of sin, though resolute, must never become the rejection of sinners. For every sinner, regardless of the sin, is loved by God, who seeks not our destruction but rather the conversion of our hearts. Jesus calls all who wander from the path of virtue to “a more excellent way.” As his disciples we will reach out in love to assist all who hear the call and wish to answer it.

These are words from the Manhattan Declaration, drafted to bring about a movement of Christians who will stand together alongside other men and women of goodwill to advance the sanctity of human life, rebuild and revitalize the marriage culture, and protect religious liberty. CENTERING PRAYER

Economic Justice For All Statement!

Excerpts from the *Economic Justice For All*, a Pastoral Statement from the U.S. Catholic Conference of Bishops. **These are principles** drawn directly from Catholic teachings on economic life:

1. The economy exists for the person, not the person for economy.
2. All economic life should be shaped by moral principles. Economic choices and institutions **must** be judged by how they protect or undermine the life & dignity of the human person, support family & serve the common good.
3. A fundamental moral measure of any economy is how the poor and vulnerable are faring.
4. All people have the right to life and to secure the basic necessities of life (e.g. food, clothing, shelter, education, healthcare, safe environment and economic security).
5. All people have the right to economic initiative, to productive work, to just wages and benefits, to decent working conditions, as well as to organize & join unions or other associations.
6. All people, as able, have a corresponding duty to work, a responsibility to provide for the needs of their families, and an obligation to contribute to the broader society.
7. Free markets have both clear advantage & limits; government has essential responsibilities & limitations; voluntary groups have irreplaceable roles, but cannot substitute for the proper working of the market and just policies of the state.
8. Society has a moral obligation, including governmental action where necessary, to assure opportunity, meet basic human needs, and pursue justice in economic life.
9. Workers, owners, managers, stockholders, and consumers **are moral agents in economic life**. By our choices, initiative, creativity, and investment, we enhance or diminish economic opportunity, community life and social justice.
10. The global economy has moral dimensions & human consequences. Decisions on investments, trade, aid, and development should protect human life and promote human rights, especially for those in need wherever they live on this globe.

I recently returned from a conference on National Volunteerism with the **Points of Light Foundation**. A group called **HandsOn Network**, located throughout the USA, is providing opportunities to help in the Gulf Coast Oil Spill crisis. Instead of boycotting BP Oil, which we hope will stay in business to help pay for the clean-up/containment, it seems that those wishing to help the victims of this catastrophe can do more by prayer and/or participating in some of the following HandsOn opportunities:

HandsOn Action Centers are being set-up in 13 regional areas to help victim's of this region's environmental and economic recovery. HandsOn will train 10,000 volunteer leaders to mobilize 50,000 volunteers in an effort to provide 1 million hours in volunteer aid. The Lion Storyteller Bedtime Book

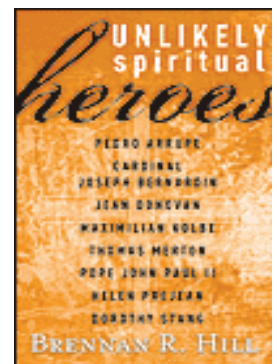

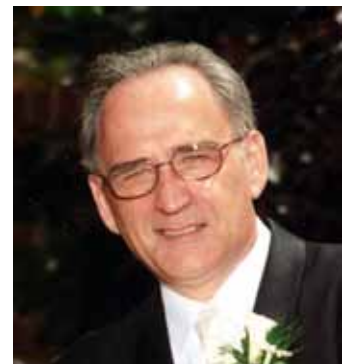

A Discipleship Parable – In Four Parts...

Part III

Dr. Christianson started down the third row. The students were beginning to get a little angry. Dr. Christianson asked Jenny, “Jenny, do you want a donut?” Sternly, Jenny said, “No.” Then Dr. Christianson asked Steve, “Steve, would you do ten more push-ups so Jenny can have a donut that she doesn’t want?” Steve did ten; Jenny got a donut.

By now, a growing sense of uneasiness filled the room. The remaining students were all saying “No”, and there were all these uneaten donuts on the desks. Steve also really had to put forth a lot of extra effort to get these push-ups done for each donut. There began to be a small pool of sweat on the floor beneath his face, his arms and brow were beginning to get red because of the physical effort involved.

Dr. Christianson asked Robert, who was the most vocal unbeliever in the class, to watch Steve do each push-up to make sure he did the full ten push-ups in a set because he couldn’t bear to watch all of Steve’s work for all of those uneaten donuts. He sent Robert over to where Steve was, so Robert could count the set and watch Steve closely.

Dr. Christianson started down the fourth row. During his class, however, some students from other classes had wandered in and sat down on the steps along the radiators that ran down the sides of the room. When the professor realized this, he did a quick count and saw that now there were 34 students in the room. He started to worry if Steve would be able to make it. Dr. Christianson went on to the next person, the next, and the next.

Near the end of that row, Steve was really having a rough time. He was taking a lot more time to complete each set. Steve asked Dr. Christianson, “Do I have to make my nose touch on each one?” Dr. Christianson thought for a moment, “Well, they’re your push-ups. You are in charge now. You can do them any way that you want.” And Dr. Christianson went on.

A few moments later, Jason, a recent transfer student, came to the room and was about to come in when all the students yelled in one voice, “NO! Don’t come in! Stay out!” Jason didn’t know what was going on. Steve picked up his head and said, “No, let him come.” Professor Christianson said, “You realize that if Jason comes in you will have to

do ten push-ups for him?” Steve said, “Yes, let him come in. Give him a donut.” Dr. Christianson said, “Okay, Steve, I’ll let you get Jason’s out of the way right now. Jason, do you want a donut?” Jason, new to the room didn’t know what was going on. “Yes,” he said, “give me a donut.” “Steve, will you do ten push-ups so that Jason can have a donut?” Steve did ten push-ups very slowly and with great effort. Leave a Legacy

What does “leave a legacy” really mean? We may have heard it or read it and decided that it really didn’t apply to someone like us. One definition of a legacy is “something passed down by an ancestor”. Most of us are already leaving a legacy as we pass our faith on to our children and grandchildren. Others of us are leaving legacies of good works in our parish and community as we donate out time and talents by serving others. Some of us may also want to leave a legacy of our treasure to help others but are uncertain about how to do it. It is easier than you may think. Here are some simple and easy ways to leave a legacy of treasure:

... A direct bequest to St Andrew Church can easily be made by adding a codicil to a will or an amendment to a trust. The bequest can be a specific dollar amount or a percentage of an estate’s total value. You can leave bequests to more than one charity by executing a simple change to your will or trust.

... An IRA or an annuity can have more than one beneficiary. For example, the IRA or annuity owner might direct that 90% of the account go to his children and 10% to a named charity.

... A life insurance policy may also have more than one beneficiary. It is a good idea to review beneficiary designations periodically anyway to make sure they are current. Your financial advisor or insurance agent can quickly provide you with the forms to make a beneficiary change at no cost to you.

... Charitable lead or remainder trusts may be appropriate for individuals who want to continue to receive income from their investments but leave the principal amount to a charity. You can also fund a trust that directs current income to a charity but leaves the principal to a different beneficiary like a family member. Before implementing any of these strategies, you should discuss them with your own advisors to see if they are appropriate for you and your family.

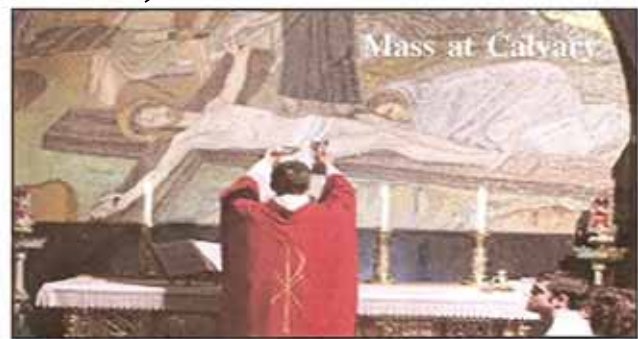
