CSA Pledge Reminders

Economic Justice For All Statement!

Excerpts from the *Economic Justice For All*, a Pastoral Statement from the U.S. Catholic Conference of Bishops. Last week we explored the 10 Principles of Catholic Social teaching related to economic life. Now, we realize we are challenged to possibly think differently and also act differently. A **renewal of economic life** depends on the conscious choices and commitments of individuals who practice their faith in worldly situations.

According to Pope John Paul II, the Catholic tradition calls for a "society of work, enterprise and participation" which "is not directed against the market, but demands that the market be appropriately controlled by the forces of society and by the state to assure that the basic needs of the whole society are satisfied." All of economic life should recognize the fact that we are all God's children and members of one human family, called to exercise a **clear priority for the least among us!** The framework for last week's 10 principles and the *Economic Justice for All* statement comes from the Catholic Church Catechism and recent papal encyclicals. So we are called to conversion and common action, to new forms of **stewardship, service, and citizenship**.

It is now over 2 decades since this statement on *Economic Justice for All* was released by the US Bishops. In reflection of the time that has gone by, we are reminded that as people of faith we should believe we are one human family, not competing classes. We are brothers & sisters, not economic units or statistics. We must come together around the values of our faith to shape economic policies that protect all human life, promote strong families, create decent jobs, expand a stable middle class, and reduce the level of poverty and need in our society. We need to strengthen our sense of community and the pursuit for the common good.

Our church leaders call for a renewed Catholic voice and dialogue in pursuit of a more just, productive and human economy! Its up to you and me to make a difference! It is suggested that we **look back** at the major themes/principles of this statement. To **look around** at the US economy, noting progress and our continued problems. And, to **look ahead** at future challenges in light of our developing Catholic teaching. - Joe Soncrant, CSC

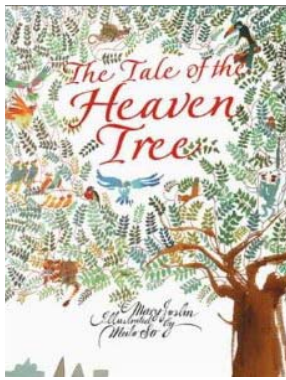
Being a Blessing to Someone Else Every Day

Here is a story I read about the person who started Movement 77 (Help God change your world seven minutes a day, seven days a week).

"Today, it was over 100 degrees out. Horrible humidity too. While driving to get my tire fixed on my van I noticed some homeless people wandering around in this heat. My heart sank. As soon as I was done at the garage I went to the store and picked up some Gatorade, ice and bags of trail mix. I headed home to pick up my 3 kids (1, 2 and 16 years old), loaded the van with the cooler and went off to pass them out. We found 3 homeless guys walking in the heat with the weight of their backpacks and gave them ice cold Gatorade and bags of trail mix. The best part was seeing the look on my 16 year old's face as he handed them the drinks and hearing my 2 year old say 'God bless you!' from the back seat. This is how my kids and I have passed the very long year that my husband, their dad, our hero, has been in Iraq. 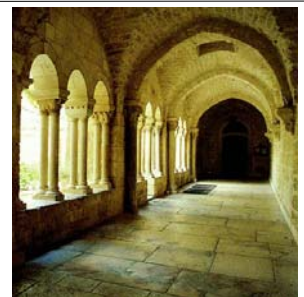

A Discipleship Parable – In Four Parts...

Part IV - Conclusion

Dr. Christianson finished going down the fourth row, then started on those visitors seated by the heaters. Steve's arms were now shaking with each push-up in a struggle to lift himself against the force of gravity. Sweat was profusely dropping off his face and, by this time, there was no sound except his heavy breathing, there was not a dry eye in the room. The very last two students in the room were two young women, both cheerleaders, and very popular.

Dr. Christianson went to Linda, the second to last, and asked, "Linda, do you want a doughnut?" Linda said, very sadly, "No, thank you." Professor Christianson quietly asked, "Steve, would you do ten push-ups so that Linda can have a donut she doesn't want?" Grunting from the effort, Steve did ten very slow push-ups for Linda. Then Dr. Christianson turned to the last girl, Susan. "Susan, do you want a donut?" Susan, with tears flowing down her face, began to cry. "Dr. Christianson, why can't I help him?"

Dr. Christianson, with tears of his own, said, "No, Steve has to do it alone. I have given him this task, and he is in charge of seeing that everyone has an opportunity for a donut whether they want it or not. When I decided to have a party this last day of class, I looked at my grade book. Steve, here is the only student with a perfect grade. Everyone else has failed a test, skipped class, or offered me inferior work. Steve told me that in football practice, when a player messes up he must do push-ups. I told Steve that none of you could come to my party unless he paid the price by doing your push-ups. He and I made a deal for your sakes. Steve, would you do your ten push-ups so Susan can have a donut?" As Steve very slowly finished his last push-up, with the understanding that he had accomplished all that was required of him, having done 350 push-ups, his arms buckled beneath him and he fell to the floor. Dr. Christianson turned to the room and said, "And so it was, that our Savior, Jesus Christ, on the cross, pleaded to the Father, 'into thy hands I commend my spirit'. With the understanding that He had done everything that was required of Him, He yielded up His life. Like some of those in this room, many of us leave His gift on the desk,

uneaten."

Two students helped Steve up off the floor and to a seat, physically exhausted, but wearing a thin smile.

"Well done, good and faithful servant" said the professor, adding, "Not all sermons are preached in words." Turning to his class the professor said, "My wish is that you might understand and fully comprehend all the riches of grace and mercy that have been given to you through the sacrifice of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. God spared not his only begotten Son, but gave Him up for all, for all people, now and forever. Whether or not we choose to accept His gift to us, the price has been paid. Wouldn't you be foolish and ungrateful to leave it lying on the desk?"

Leave a Legacy

What does "leave a legacy" really mean? We may have heard it or read it and decided that it really didn't apply to someone like us. One definition of a legacy is "something passed down by an ancestor". Most of us are already leaving a legacy as we pass our faith on to our children and grandchildren. Others of us are leaving legacies of good works in our parish and community as we donate out time and talents by serving others. Some of us may also want to leave a legacy of our treasure to help others but are uncertain about how to do it. It is easier than you may think. Here are some simple and easy ways to leave a legacy of treasure:

... A direct bequest to St Andrew Church can easily be made by adding a codicil to a will or an amendment to a trust.

... An IRA or an annuity can have more than one beneficiary.

... A life insurance policy may also have more than one beneficiary. It is a good idea to review beneficiary designations periodically anyway.

... Charitable lead or remainder trusts may be appropriate for individuals who want to continue to receive income from their investments but leave the principal amount to a charity.
