On The Lenten Journey

+Perhaps the most overlooked line in this famous gospel passage is that Jesus had just *returned from the Jordan*. He had just been filled with the grace of the Holy Spirit (his own Spirit) in the waters of the Jordan, an “anointing” which established Him publicly as the Christ, the Anointed One. That same Spirit had overshadowed Mary and led to her conceiving the Lord; that same Spirit had inspired Simeon to recognize a small baby as the Messiah; that same Spirit goes out of Jesus when He performs miracles; and that same Spirit will raise Him from the dead (CCC 695).

It is the Spirit who now leads Him into the desert for forty days. Certainly, that Spirit never parted from Him in that lonely place, but instead inspired his prayer. Prayer was Christ’s usual habit to discern and obey the will of the Father, and to prepare himself for whatever momentous event was ahead of Him. We should look at his example upon which to model our efforts in deepening our prayer life.

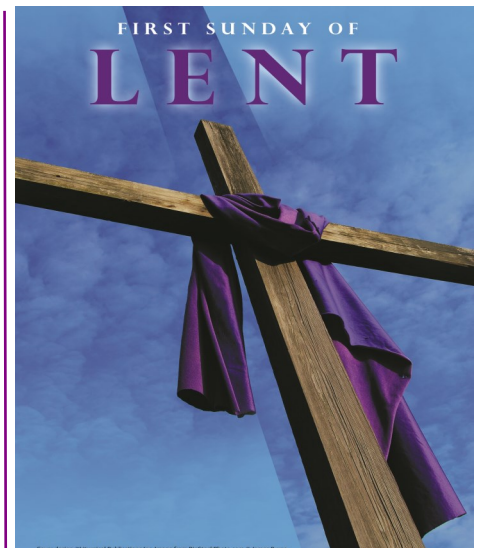
Sustained by only grace and prayer, Christ encounters the devil. Imagine – the devil tries to put God himself to the test! Famously, the devil tempts Him three times. The devil commands Christ to turn stones into bread to satisfy his physical needs. Christ refuses because *one does not live by bread alone* (Deut. 8:3). The devil asks Christ to worship him, claiming he will give Him all the kingdoms of the world. Christ refuses, stating that *you shall worship the Lord, your God, and Him alone shall you serve* (Deut. 6:13). Finally, the devil asks Christ to prove that He is the Son of God by throwing himself down from the highest point of the Temple because angels will guard Him. Christ refuses, saying, *you shall not put the Lord, your God to the test* (Deut. 6:16).

Each time, sustained by the Spirit and with a command of God’s revealed word, Christ can resist temptation. He is victorious over temptation just as He will be victorious over death.

Like that devil in the desert, how often do we put God to the test? How often do we “negotiate” with God and ignore his will to suit our own? How often do we pray that “yours is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory” – yet turn away to seek our own glory, to demand our own power and to build our own little kingdoms?

This Lent, let us resolve to be fortified by the same thing which gave Jesus strength against evil. Like Jesus, let us cultivate a deeper prayer life. Let us turn to Sacred Scripture to discern God’s will for us and to hear God speaking to us. Let us rely on

the abiding presence of the Holy Spirit when we are weak, and thank Him when we are made strong.

Then, when these forty days of Lent are through, may we sing ever more joyfully that Christ has conquered sin and death – and given us the gift of eternal salvation!

+It was good to see many join us for our Ash Wednesday celebrations. The ashes remind us that we are all sinners, but through the power of the cross marked on our foreheads, we can rise from the ashes and experience the transformation that Christ is calling us to embrace. In making our resolutions for this season of prayer, fasting and almsgiving, may I encourage you to consider what you might be able to give to our parish family in terms of your time and talent? We are in need of ushers and greeters, and more Eucharistic ministers and lectors/readers to help at mass. It would also be of service for our younger members to sign up as altar servers. Having gone to the system where you take an “active” approach by signing up for a mass, we have found over this past year that many masses go without any sign-ups. It makes our job of preparing for mass a little more difficult when we always have to announce/ask for servers. If you haven’t signed up, please just come to the sacristy and check the list. It would be great to have 3-4 servers at EVERY mass!

Also be sure to keep a copy of the bulletin handy to remind you at home for upcoming Lenten activities. Cut the schedule out and post it on the fridge for your easy reference.

+The new addition on the west (bell tower) side of the church has certainly taken on its form and dimensions now that the steel columns and beams have been set! The masons have been moving forward to finish their work with the block/brick that will rest on those beams. We look forward to the roof going on, so we can start to “dry out” the ground below and get the inside underground work started, and then move toward finishing it all out. Again, I can’t thank you enough for your support of our project in so many ways – with your prayers and donations!

And while the workers are working hard, there is a lot of activity going on around the building, with large pieces of equipment (cranes, lifts, scaffolding, etc.) constantly in motion. PLEASE, PLEASE do NOT drive around the east side of the church in the work zones during the week; it is dangerous and we do not want anyone to get hurt by being in an accident. Sundays - when the lots are open for services - would be the day to take a “slow drive” through and check things out.

Financially, we have been paying these past months with money out of our savings, but we have determined that we now will hold the present balance as our “safety cushion” and move into the “loan draw” period of our project. We have an approved loan of up to \$3M available, but we hope to keep it below that amount. Your generosity so far has helped us believe that we will be able to do that.

+An upcoming activity involving the next phases of our Archdiocesan *Unleash the Gospel* efforts will be to work with the parish community in coming up with our “missionary strategic plan.” This plan will encompass our efforts to help our family grow in our relationship with the Lord in various ways. I will keep you posted as more details are defined.

+Let us remember to pray not only for ourselves this Lent, but to pray for one another and our entire parish community. I look forward to journeying with you this season. See you in church!

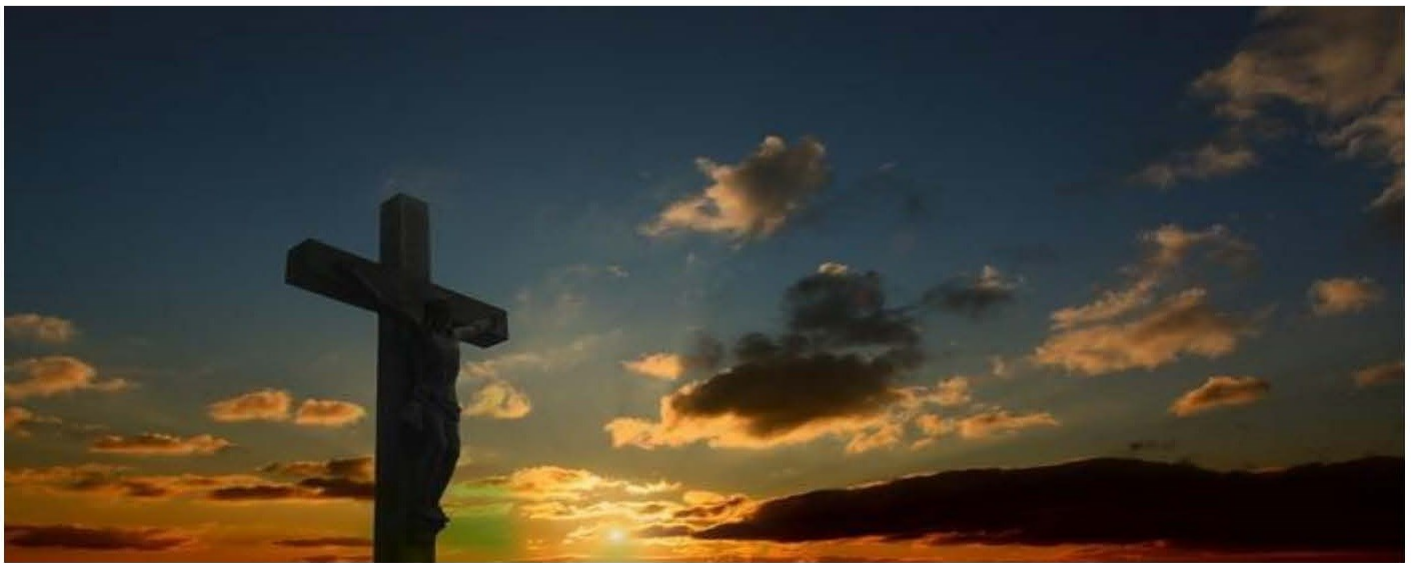

Lenten Prayers for a Miraculous Healing for Martynka

Over three months ago, I asked for your prayers and financial support for 4-year-old Martynka Kaczmarek from Rybnik, Poland. She was diagnosed with Stage IV Neuroblastoma – an aggressive cancer that has metastasized to her liver, lungs, bones and marrow. She needed over \$ 425,000 for her treatment.

After a miraculous fundraiser and thanks to the generous hearts of many in Poland and in the USA (Martynka GoFundMe \$37,000!), Martynka began her treatment in the Clinic in Greifswald, Germany before Christmas, 2018. Today she has completed two chemotherapy treatments but unfortunately her illness is unresponsive. On Monday March 4, just before Ash Wednesday, she began the last chance experimental chemotherapy for another 8 weeks. If that doesn't help, she will be transferred to palliative care. Her parents, family and those who know her and her story still have a hope for a miracle.

Today, on this first Sunday of Lent, I'd like to thank all of you who have supported Martynka financially and prayerfully. I beg you for more prayers for a miraculous healing for her, and for strength and trust for her parents. Please, add this one small prayer "Jesus take care Martynka – we trust in YOU" to your everyday prayers especially during this Lent! Please!

Our God is a God of love, the God of miracles, we believe that. May He, through our prayers, reveal His healing power, restore her health and let her enjoy her childhood!

"God of Mercy, may Your will be done!"

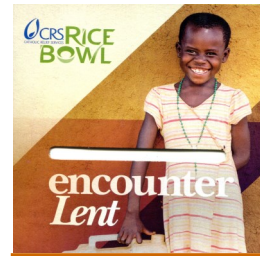

CRS RICE BOWL is Catholic Relief Services'

Lenten faith-in-action program for families & faith communities. Through CRS Rice Bowl we deepen our personal experience of Lent, and read stories from our brothers & sisters in need worldwide. So we devout our Lenten prayers, fasting and gifts to transform our relationship with God and neighbor. We are made in God's image and likeness. Every human being has special value & purpose. We must care for each other so we can be the people God calls us to be. *Now, let us encounter Norma?*

For young families living in the mountains of Guatemala, raising a baby can be hard. Most families grow corn and beans for a living, but a long-standing drought has caused harvests to shrink. There are few job opportunities, which means putting food on the table is a daily challenge. When Norma discovered she was pregnant, she worried how she would manage. Norma remembers how sometimes she and her four siblings would split one egg for a meal. She wanted more for her son, Victor. At the age of 20, she didn't have much experience beyond helping her mother with chores.

Norma found help in a CRS-sponsored program that teaches young mothers how to raise healthy children, grow nutritious food in small gardens and manage a healthy diet. CRS provided food during her pregnancy and monthly medical check-ups until Victor was two years old. Norma is now sharing what she learned with others as a "mother monitor" with CRS. "It makes me proud to share the experience I had and the lessons I learned with other women," she says. And, it makes her community a better place to live. **Nutritious food is necessary for a dignified life. If none is available, families may be forced to migrate!** Consider the population of Guatemala is 15,460,730. The size is slightly smaller than Pennsylvania. The population is the highest of all Central American countries. **CRS has provided humanitarian assistance in Guatemala since 1963 ... thanks to you!**

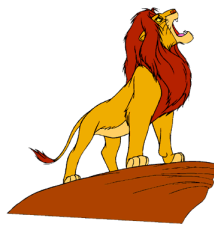

Throughout life's journey, we get hooks in us. We get hooked by our phones, Netflix, games, our beds, procrastination, depression, social media, etc. We let these objects and mentalities hold us back from being the best version of ourselves. Does this describe you? You'll feel depressed and decide to watch some Netflix...4 hours later you feel even worse about yourself because you didn't get the tasks you needed to get done. So as a result, you then decide to watch more Netflix. I've been there. We're letting Netflix suck the soul out of us like a Dementor's kiss. Lent is the time the Church sets aside for us to take time to shake off some of these hooks that hold us back.

Lent is the spring cleaning of our soul! It is an opportunity to grow in maturity, love, and faith. Lent brings in the spiritual when we offer something up. For example, I have a tendency to get hungry and snack. A few years ago, my friend introduced me to fasting with a purpose. It's basically saying "God, I really want you to answer this prayer. To show how serious I am, I'm going to say no to all food for 24 hours." It's like the Friends episode where Rachel told Ross that if he wanted her to go to the banquet, he'd have to drink the fat in the fridge. Rachel obviously spared Ross from actually drinking it, but Ross desired Rachel to go so much that it was worth it.

This isn't a call to ask for a prayer and drink fat to prove you really want it, but it is an encouragement to look at your life to see what vices may have its grips in you that may be pulling yourself away from God. "God, I've been watching too much Netflix/Hulu. This Lent I am going to give it up and take that time I gain to clean my room, get homework done sooner, work on my dreams, and most importantly, pray and read the Bible." Lent isn't about just giving something up, it's giving something up with a purpose. Why are you giving up what you did? How is it bringing you closer to Christ?

In Eastern Europe, in the Caucasus region, the small country of Georgia nestles between Armenia and Russia. In 1921 Georgia was taken over by the Red Army and became one of the first countries to be incorporated into the Soviet Union. After 70 years of oppression under the Soviet regime, the Georgian people declared independence in 1991, and the Church entered a new era of freedom.

No longer ruled by a repressive regime, the Georgian people are rebuilding the Church and society after decades of persecution. They have made strides to heal their wounds, but work remains to be done. Catholics in Georgia live primarily in rural villages, where it is all but impossible to find medical care. Vulnerable populations like the elderly, disabled, children, and expectant mothers suffer the most.

With your support for the Collection for the Church in Central and Eastern Europe (CCEE), the Church in Georgia has worked through the network of parishes to expand medical services to respond to the needs of these remote villages. Many of our brothers and sisters who live in these villages now have access to qualified nursing services, doctors, and medication. Your generosity is balm for the wounds of an abandoned people. You are bringing the light of Christ and strength of his healing so they know that they are not forgotten.

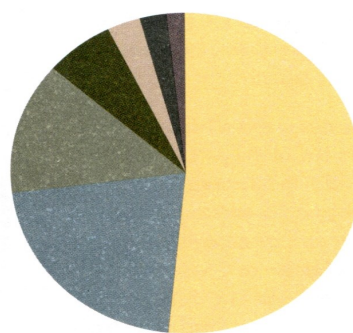

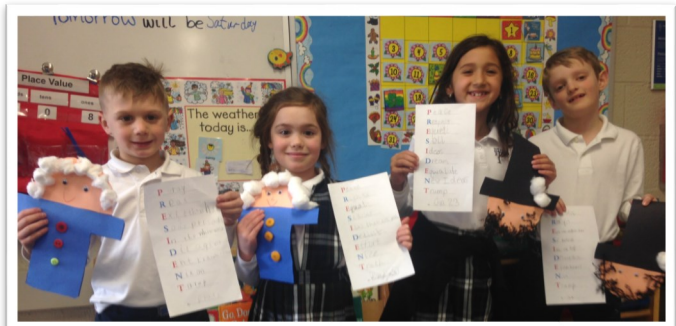
MY PERSONAL MICHIGAN HERO
