On The Lenten Journey

+One of the chief characteristics of Jesus' life is his commitment to prayer. At every key moment from baptism to death, Jesus shows himself as a man of prayer. As disciples, we, too, are called to be people of prayer, so this might be a good moment for us to review our life of prayer as we walk along our Lenten journey.

Like all relationships, our relationship with God takes time and effort – time to talk, share our lives and get to know Him in all his glory and life-changing power. And just as God wants us to share our needs, He also asks that we stop and listen to his word.

With all this in mind, we hear this weekend from Luke's account of the Transfiguration. At first glance, it might seem an odd selection for Lent: why not a Gospel on healing or mercy? But this is not an arbitrary choice; it is chosen to encourage and strengthen us as we undertake our Lenten practices, and to remind us that through them we hope to share in the glory of God, glimpsed here in Christ on the mountaintop. Lenten practices by themselves are meaningless if they do not have this greater meaning; indeed the whole Lenten season is without purpose if it does not ultimately lead to the glory of Easter.

Luke's account follows the other synoptic Gospels: Jesus leads his disciples up the mountain to pray. Suddenly, they are witnesses to something new as the glory of God shines through his humanity, and the prophets Moses and Elijah appear in conversation with Him. These, too, were mountain men who in times of struggle sought solace in the high peaks. There they encountered God and were renewed and strengthened in their mission.

Glimpsing Jesus' glory, Peter begins to panic, and as so often happens in the face of what is new and unsettling, he falls back onto what is familiar and less threatening. His suggestions for three tents shows how much he has yet to learn about Jesus.

But from the cloud that covers the mountain comes the Father's voice: *This is my chosen Son, listen to Him.* Here is the true purpose of this theophany, this "Godreveal": Jesus is more than just another prophet. He is God's chosen Son. Here are words that all must hear and accept if they are to be transformed and changed.

In the darkness of our sometimes sinful world, we need to hear these words again. We, too, must be willing to climb the mountain and to experience the glory of God. We need to hear again the words of the Father as Jesus is revealed as the one who speaks on his behalf and is worthy of our attention and obedience.

PARISH MISSION



St. Patrick

St. Patrick of Ireland is one of the world's most popular saints. He was born in Roman Britain and when he was fourteen or so, he was captured by Irish pirates and taken to Ireland as a slave to herd and tend sheep. At the time, Ireland was a land of Druids and pagans but Patrick turned to God and wrote his memoir, *The Confession*.

Patrick's captivity lasted until he was

twenty, when he escaped after having a dream from God in which he was told to leave Ireland by going to the coast. There he found some sailors who took him back to Britain and was reunited with his family.

A few years after returning home, Patrick saw a vision. The vision prompted his studies for the priesthood. He was ordained by St. Germanus and was later ordained a bishop and sent to take the Gospel to Ireland.

There are several legends about what happened next, but Patrick was able to convert many people and he began building churches across the country. He often used shamrocks to explain the Holy Trinity.

Patrick preached and converted all of Ireland for 40 years. After years of living in poverty, traveling and enduring much suffering he died March 17, 461.

Patrick was a humble, pious, gentle man, whose love and total devotion to and trust in God should be a shining example to each of us.

"The Breastplate," Patrick's poem of faith and trust in God:

"Christ be within me, Christ behind me, Christ before me, Christ beside me, Christ to win me, Christ to comfort and restore me, Christ beneath me, Christ above me, Christ inquired, Christ in danger, Christ in hearts of all that love me, Christ in mouth of friend and stranger."

March 19 Solemnity St. Joseph, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary

Saint Joseph has two feast days during the year: on May first we celebrate the feast day of Saint Joseph the Worker, and on that day we reflect especially on how St. Joseph shows us what great dignity there is in such an ordinary

thing as work. On March 19th, we celebrate Saint Joseph as the husband of Mary: we celebrate especially on this feast the fidelity—the faithfulness—that we see reflected in the life of this man Joseph. All of our readings on this feast draw our mind to the enduring nature of the covenant between the Lord and His People.

It is specifically as the spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary that we honor Saint Joseph today, and it is the spousal nature of Joseph's life that mirrors in his earthly life the enduring fidelity of the Lord. From his place in heaven, St. Joseph is the patron of the universal Church, that instrument by which the Lord wishes to make a covenant with each member of the human race, making each person a member of His divine Son's Body. It is the Church that proclaims to the world yet converted the faithfulness of the Lord, and it is the Church that is given by the Lord the promise that He will strengthen us in all our trials.

Fun Facts for St. Patrick's Day

We are all familiar with St. Patrick's Day celebrations and traditions. He used a shamrock to explain the Trinity, God as Father, Son and Holy Spirit, to teach the Irish about Christianity. He was said to have driven the snakes out of Ireland. His feast is celebrated in many countries by people of Irish descent.

But here are some fun facts that you may not know.

St. Patrick's Day in Ireland always begins with Mass, for it is a reverent occasion as well as a reason to celebrate. Paddy (not "Patty"!) is a shortened version of Padraig, the Gaelic name for Patrick. The first St. Patrick's Day parade did not originate in Ireland, but in Boston in 1737, followed by one in New York City in 1762. Ireland's first parade was in 1903, when St. Patrick's Day was made an official holiday. In downtown Chicago, the Chicago River is dyed green. And while I have not seen the research, I hear that wearing green will make you invisible to mischievous leprechauns.

Irish or not, if you've put aside your Lenten restrictions today to celebrate, enjoy!

Irish Soda Scones

Preheat oven to 425*. Whisk together 2 C flour, 2t baking powder, ¼ t baking soda, ¼ C sugar, ½ t salt. Cut 1 stick cold, unsalted butter into small pieces, work into mixture with pastry cutter or fingers until dough resembles coarse meal. Add ½ C dried currants, 2t caraway seeds, and 1 C cold buttermilk. Stir until just combined. Scoop 1/3 C size mounds onto parchment-lined baking sheet, 3" apart. Bake 15-20 minutes, until bottoms are golden. Let cool on sheet. Combine 1C confectioners' sugar, 2T milk and ¼ t grated orange zest. Drizzle over scones; serve.

Is Hospitality Taken For Grante

Hospitality is a "hygiene" gift. You don't really notice when people have good hygiene. They have their hair done, their clothes aren't wrinkled, there isn't dirt on their face, they don't smell, or have bad breath. You notice very quickly when they have bad hygiene. In a car you don't notice oil until it's not lubricating the engine properly. Hospitality is the same thing. You don't notice when the party host regularly takes out the garbage, refills the punch, or cleans the bathrooms because it doesn't put a kink in your experience. But when those things are missing, you notice it. You may not be able to put your finger on the issue, but you know things could have gone better. So how can we become more hospitable?

The rule of thumb for hospitality is "if I was this person, what would make me feel valued?" Obviously you don't put your desires on the other person because if a vegan comes to my house and I cook up steaks because "if I was going to a friend's house for dinner, I'd like a steak." That's not going to work too well. I could, however, find a March vegan recipe and make it, or tell him in advance I'm not 17th - Hospitality (6-8:15) cooking. That way he knows to eat before he comes over for the game. All of this sounds simple, but it takes a lot 30th-Lent Halfway Check (6-8:15) of foresight.

Being hospitable is being aware of what's going on April around you and acting on it. For example, when you're sitting at a full table and someone else is coming, you grab an extra chair. If you're asked to take out the garbage, you put a new bag in the can before putting it away. If you invite people over for a gathering, make sure they all have the address to get to your house. These are little things that go a long way. The more hospitable we become, the more we value other people. The more we value others, the more we are in sync with God. The more we're in sync with God, our Creator, the more joyful life becomes. So for the rest of this Lent, try to put vourself in someone else's shoes and act on it.

Ash Wednesday has passed and we are making progress. The masons were working on Ash Wednesday and they had to quit early because even with a "heated tent" up over the veneer bricks they were laying, it was so cold the mortar was freezing. Now that's cold!


The structural steel has gone up in the gathering space and we are hoping that in the next two weeks the wood glu-lam will go up on and once that is completed the roof will go on. The area can then be "enclosed" and heated so they can begin working on the floor. Depending on how wet and muddy the soil is once it's

un-frozen, they may have to remove some of it and replace it with dry soil instead of waiting for it to dry out using the heaters. Once that's all determined and complete, they can begin to lay the underground utilities and then the cement floor can be poured. Everything is still dependent on the weather; come on spring.
