On The Journey

+As Church, we have honored the countless learned and holy women and men – teachers of all generations and cultures who have dedicated their lives to the advancement not only of holy wisdom, but of earthly knowledge. From the writer of Sirach in our first reading, to Saint Paul the great evangelist and preacher, to modern theologians and catechists, they have shared their knowledge and wisdom and laid before us their insights and learning.

There are even those among us who may have less formal scholarship and education, but lead lives and speak truths that advance the Gospel. They are all teachers of the faith who have helped us to mine and understand the mysteries of this world and the world to come. They have helped us to understand how God is present in our world and in those great moments of life and death.

Knowledge, integrity and responsibility ae necessary qualities for anyone who wishes to teach, or share, the faith. Jesus is scathing when these are absent; one is guilty of hypocrisy when one ignores serious matters and insists that others adhere to minor things. Likewise, if we all concentrate on removing the splinters in our own lives, we would have no time to judge and gossip about the faults and struggles of others.

For Jesus, the ultimate success of an individual's effort relies on the effect they have on the lives of others. The true teacher will produce *good fruit*; the uninformed, self-centered or misguided teacher will produce *rotten fruit*. The status of the fruit reveals the true nature of the tree.

The blind cannot lead the blind. Good produces good, and evil produces evil. As we heard in the reading from Sirach, so too does one's speech disclose the bent of one's mind. So let us always, as Saint Paul says, be firm, steadfast, always fully devoted to the work of the Lord. For the ways of the Lord are always and only good, and thus so shall be what we teach, preach and live as a result

As we prepare to enter the season of Lent, let us nourish our hearts and bodies with the perfect gift from God in the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ. May this Gift give us the grace to be firm and steadfast as Paul encourages, and to bear good fruit for the world in which we live.

+Not only is it March, but we enter the holy season of Lent with the celebration of Ash Wednesday this week! There will be multiple opportunities to receive ashes over the course of the day: masses will be at 8:15a.m.; 12:15p.m.; 2p.m. (Holy Family school mass, but all are welcome!); and 7:30p.m. There will also be a Scripture Service at 4:30p.m. with Deacon Marc, which will also include the distribution of ashes.

Also during Lent, we have Eucharistic Adoration each Friday after the 8:15a.m. mass until 7p.m. That will be followed with the praying of the Stations of the Cross in the church. (Stations are also prayed as a group after the Wednesday morning masses, with lay leadership guiding attendees through this wonderful tradition.)

Hopefully you will plan and attend our parish mission this year, with Friar Johnpaul Cafiero leading us on Sunday, March 24 through Tuesday, March 26. Our theme will be "No Greater Love," with reflections on the seven last words of Jesus. These special sessions will be held from 7 to 8:30p.m. on each of those three evenings, with a time of hospitality to follow. Friar Johnpaul will also be at various masses on the weekend and during the week. Why not join us for a time of Lenten renewal – and bring a family member or friend?!

+My prayerful gratitude to all who have been supporting our CSA/Building Campaign efforts so far this year!! Recent gifts have taken us to \$823,148 in pledges and donations, which is \$479,248 above our CSA target of \$343,900. That gives us an anticipated refund of over \$479 thousand coming back to the parish (of which more than \$334 thousand has *already* come back!!).

Lenten Fast & Abstinence

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence.

For members of the Latin Catholic Church, the norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal. Two smaller meals may also be taken, but not to equal a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding upon members of the Latin Catholic Church from age 14 onwards.

Those that are excused from fast and abstinence outside the age limits include the physically or mentally ill including individuals suffering from chronic illnesses such as diabetes. Also excluded are pregnant or nursing women. In all cases, common sense should prevail, and ill persons should not further jeopardize their health by fasting.

Given the current economic environment, CCRT is finding it very difficult to meet the needs of the growing client base.

We, Not Me


Humility is putting others before yourself...but who would want to do that? How to Find Time in the Day for Lent

The fast pace of your life may seem to leave little time and energy for the traditional Lenten practices. But you can weave moments of <u>spiritual awareness</u> and service into even the busiest of schedules. The trick is to see Lenten practice as part of, rather than in addition to, each activity of your ordinary heetic day.

The three foundational practices of Lent are prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Here's how to think about them in a new way:

Praying Daily

If you make a habit of saying a little prayer whenever someone irritates you, cuts you off in traffic, or makes life difficult; when someone does you a favor, you experience great and friendly service, or when something joyful happens to you—you will soon find yourself praying your way through the day. Try this simple practice and you will be observing the Catholic Church's call for greater prayer during the Lenten season. You will also find that this habit makes your life flow smoother, your self more centered, and your Spirit more aware of God's presence.

A Different Type of Fasting

There are many ways to fast. Why not fast from criticism, gossip, judging others, or passing on rumors? Why not abstain from unwarranted fear and anxiety? You can also tell that inner voice inside your head that criticizes you to abstain from eroding your ability to be the confident, blessed person God calls you to be. These are beautiful ways to observe the Lenten call to fasting and abstinence. In the book, *Praying Lent*, the authors offer suggestions on different ways to fast during Lent.

Give of Yourself

Daily life also offers countless opportunities to give of yourself to others (alms), and most don't involve dipping into your wallet. Give encouragement to the doubting, give a word of praise to the insecure, show kindness to someone who could use a friend, and offer a word of thanks to those whose service of others often goes unappreciated. Give the gift of your attention to someone who simply wants to be noticed. Tell your children stories about people whose values you admire when you gather at mealtime. Don't be stingy with your smiles—give them freely to everyone you meet. And most important, give your love to those close to you. Hug them, hold them, and tell them what they mean to you. In this way you open your heart to God and others.

So no matter how busy you are in life, with some greater awareness and new perspectives you can consciously pray, fast, and give of yourself this Lent—and you will be ready to celebrate when a joyful dawn breaks upon you Easter morning.




