On The Journey

+In two readings this Sunday, people are cured of their leprosy – Naaman by the prophet Elisha, and 10 people, including a Samaritan, by Jesus. In both of these healings, the people are restored to physical and communal life – renewed in health and re-established in a society that had kept them separate for fear of contagion.

In each reading, there is a response to this healing. Naaman expresses gratitude to Elisha and asks for *two mule-loads of earth* so that he can offer his sacrifices to the God of Elisha rather than his own god. The Samaritan, the only one of the 10 who appears to realize that he has been cured, returns to Jesus and glorifies God. In both cases, faith had saved them and had prompted the proper response.

Jesus, the eternal Word of God, is still healing us today. If we turn to Jesus in trust, He can cleanse us of the most basic of all human ailments – sin. Jesus, the Word of God, is unchained, as Saint Paul writes to Timothy. He remains faithful to those who are faithful. And we, who have died to sin with Him in Baptism, shall also live with Him. This gift of life, of restoring us to communion with God, is one available to us in faith. When accepted in faith, the only proper response is worship.

The more we respond in faith and in worship, the greater the graces, and the easier and more joyful is our relationship with the Triune God – who desires nothing more than for us to spend eternity with Him.

We see in these readings that the proper response to God is worship – in gratitude and in faith. May the graces we receive continue to transform us and bring us ever closer to Him!

+My heartfelt and prayerful gratitude to all who helped in any way with the celebration of Fr. Tim Babcock's funeral last Monday. We were blessed to have him join us at the dedication just two short weeks before his death. I know how happy he was to engage many in conversation that day of his visit. I, too, was blessed to talk with him on the Sunday before his passing. I was also part of a small group of priests who gathered monthly for support and social engagement, and Fr. Babcock was also part of that group.

Again, thanks to anyone and everyone who helped in this celebration of his life! Eternal rest grant unto him, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon him. Amen!



Anointing of the Sick

Mass with Anointing of the Sick

Saturday, November 2 at 12:00pm

During the course of the year the parish has a special Mass for those who desire to receive the Anointing of the Sick during Mass. As we approach our communal celebration of the Sacrament, it seems appropriate to provide some basic information about what the Church teaches.

The Sacrament of **Anointing** of the Sick is NOT just for the dying! It is also a beautiful sacrament for healing and strength. The Catechism of the Catholic Church's section on <u>the Anointing of the Sick</u> defines the purpose of the sacrament as "the conferral of a special grace on the Christian experiencing the difficulties inherent in the condition of grave illness or old age." (*Catechism*, 1527)

The Sacrament of Anointing is appropriate for those whose health is seriously impaired by sickness or advanced age. This includes persons who are seriously ill whether at home, in hospitals or in nursing homes, as well as seriously sick children who are old enough to experience benefit from the Sacrament. Those who will be undergoing surgery may also benefit from the Sacrament. While the parish will have a special Mass with Anointing of the Sick in October, the Sacrament of Anointing is available year round and can be arranged by calling the parish office.

If you would like to be anointed at this mass, please call the parish office with your name and phone number by October 30th.



October 12th & 13th: Racism & the Global Migration and Refugee Crisis "There are no single-issue saints...[rather] the saints teach us that whenever human life is threatened, whenever the image of God is obscured and violated, we are called to rise up and defend it."

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops , in their pastoral letter from 2018, "Open Wide our Hearts: The Enduring Call to Love," unequivocally states that, "**racism is a life issue**", as "the injustice and harm racism causes are an attack on human life. "

They continue by stating that the history of institutional and systemic racism in the United States has left us with a society in which, people of color are "disproportionally affected by poverty, targeted for abortion, have less access to healthcare, have the greatest numbers on death row, and are most likely to feel pressure to end their lives when facing serious illness".

`While we may not personally be racist, the economic and social consequences of racism still threaten the lives of our brothers and sisters of color. As Christians, we are called "to join others in advocating and promoting policies...that will combat racism and its effects in our civic and social institutions".

Similarly, the church views the global migration and refugee crisis, in which a record number of people have been forced from home and struggle to find safety, as a life issue. His Eminence, Archbishop Seán Cardinal O'Malley, O.F.M. Cap, explained in a 2014 homily, " "We know that the border is lined with unmarked graves of thousands who die alone and nameless." Immigration is "another pro-life issue," the cardinal reminds us, echoing our Holy Father Pope Francis, who views abortion, extreme economic inequality and the death of migrants as part of a "globalization of indifference" and a "throwaway culture" that treats human beings as disposable.

Bishop Daniel E. Flores of Brownsville, Texas, stated in an interview with *Crux* that support for mass deportation is "formal cooperation with an intrinsic evil - not unlike driving someone to an abortion clinic" as deportation to Central America and Mexico places migrants "in proximate danger of death".

The Church has articulated two important principles regarding migration, which are meant to preserve the life and dignity of migrants and refugees.

CHRIST HOLE IN EVERY SEASON OF

- People have the right to migrate to sustain their lives and the lives of their families. Every person has an equal right to receive from the earth what is necessary for life—food, clothing, shelter. Moreover, every person has the right to education, medical care, religion, and the expression of one's culture. When a person cannot achieve a meaningful life in his or her own land or lives in fear, danger, or dehumanizing conditions, that person has the right to move. The right to seek asylum is an instrument to preserve the right to life and should be respected.
- We are called to respond to migrants and refugees with mercy and love. Current immigration policy that criminalizes the mere attempt to immigrate, separates mothers from their children, and imprisons immigrants who have committed no crime or is immoral. In the Bible, God promises that our judgment will be based on our treatment of the most vulnerable. Before God we cannot excuse inhumane treatment of certain persons by claiming that their lack of legal status deprives them of rights given by the Creator.

According to Pope Francis, it is through migrants especially the most vulnerable, that "the Lord is calling us to conversion, to be set free from exclusivity, indifference and the throw-away culture. Through them, the Lord invites us to embrace fully our Christian life and to contribute... to the build-ing up of a world that is more and more in accord with God's plan. "

As we continue along our journey as a people of life, let us not forget that, "as Christians, we cannot be indifferent to the contempt and discrimination experienced by those who do not belong to 'our group'... We cannot remain insensitive, our hearts deadened, before the misery of so many innocent people. We must not fail to weep. We must not fail to respond ."

When we experience anxiety or sadness, we can offer it up in prayer. Knowing that Jesus is with us in our difficulties makes life more bearable. We can offer up our joy as well, in thanks and praise. In 1Thessalonians 5:16-18, St. Paul tells us, "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." Holding Jesus close and talking to him often helps us appreciate that the answer truly is Jesus!



Proverbs 3:5-6 says


Trust in the LORD with all your heart, and do not rely on your own insight. In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make straight your paths.



Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults and Children

How does one become Catholic?

Many Catholics are born into Catholic families and gradually come to share in the full Sacramental life of the Church. Others, previously baptized in other Christian Churches or never baptized, become Catholic through a process known as The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults. Children over the age of seven participate in a modified process, The Rite of Christian Initiation of Children. The Rites of Initiation of adults and children are the Catholic Church's way of initiating new members. At St. Andrew Parish we warmly welcome new members and attempt to provide an appropriate spiritual formation for each inquirer.

Who may participate?

Those never baptized as Christians. Those baptized in another Christian faith tradition now interested in the Catholic tradition. Those baptized in the Catholic tradition whose sacramental reception is not complete. Children over the age of seven who have not received the Sacraments of Baptism, First Eucharist or Confirmation.

How long is the process?

RCIA is not a class or a program but a process of conversion. It prepares one to embark on a journey of faith that leads to a lifelong commitment as a Catholic. All Catholics are called to daily conversion and renewal of our faith journey. RCIA stresses the need for a living experience of Church as a "people of God" and not just "knowledge" about the Church. A person's desire to turn toward God

(conversion) and become connected to a community does not happen instantaneously, but takes time as the Holy Spirit nurtures the deepening desire within. The usual length of preparation is approximately nine months to a year. In most cases, the initiation of new members is celebrated at the Easter Vigil.

This is not just the job of priest and religious, but of all Christians!
