On The Journey

+As we hear this Gospel, it is hard not to conclude that this request for an increase in faith comes somehow out of the blue. So what prompted the disciples to make this unusual request? To understand that, we need to go back to previous passages in Luke's Gospel – the parables about the prodigal son, the dishonest steward, Lazarus the beggar and the rich man. Together, they point to a reality that God's ways are different from our ways. They remind us that if we are to be faithful disciples, then we must take our cue not from the world, but from Christ who reveals to us the very mind of God.

We use the word "faith" in different ways – from our denominational identity to our creedal statements. But when Luke speaks here of faith, and indeed when Paul speaks about the gift given though the laying on of hands, they are not simply speaking about creedal statements or identity. Instead, they refer to that gift from God that binds us and empowers us to follow and live in Christ. It is a relationship with the Lord. This is what the disciples sought: an increase and strengthening in that most precious of all gifts – a strong and enduring relationship with Jesus Christ.

It has never been easy to be a Catholic Christian. The early Christians had to deal with all sorts of threats and persecutions. So we can understand why this call to faith is at the heart of the Gospels. By asking Jesus for an increase, the disciples are recognizing that He is the source of this supernatural faith, and that such a faith is not the outcome of human strength or willpower, but is sheer gift from God. Because it is a gift, it can never be seen as something we can boast of as our own achievement. We are servants of the Word, and when we respond to it we are simply doing our duty.

We also live in a world where it can be difficult to be faithful disciples. In such a world, our living, acting faith is of more and more importance. To be a faith-filled Christian is not simply about having an inner conviction, but the courage and strength to live that faith on a daily basis.

Christ's word to us today is a word of encouragement that we need only a little trust – the size of a mustard seed – in his strength to carry us through this life. It is the power of God living in and through us that will ultimately empower us to be faith -filled and faithful.



Protecting the lives of the unborn is often part of our "first thoughts" at this time, but our efforts must reach out to educate and inform and work toward more than just being "Pro-Life/anti-abortion." (I must interject here how glad I was to see over 640 signatures on the petition to ban dismemberment abortions in Michigan that we signed at the picnic; I believe there are still some petitions you could sign in the parish offices, if you have not yet done so.) We must consider treatment of the elderly; the imprisoned; the immigrants; those who are impoverished, and many more examples as all falling into the category of Protecting Life! So let us be sure to pray for a greater respect for life in all its aspects!
- +This weekend, you will be able to watch a video from Holy Family Regional School as they make their annual appeal for support in the five founding parishes, and in outreach to other groups and people across our area. There are representatives scheduled to be here after all the masses to answer your questions should you have any. The school is truly a gem, so let's support it the best we can!
- +Progress slowly continues on finishing off the building. I hope and pray for greater progress on the parking lot lights, especially now that evening faith formation classes have started up. What I ask of everyone is to PLEASE NOT WALK INTO/THROUGH THE NEW WEST SPACE TILL INDICATED THAT IT IS OPEN. It becomes a matter of insurance and liability, so.....you can peek through the windows and open doors, but please do not walk in. Thanks so very much!

With regard to the building efforts, we now have pledges/donations totaling \$633,208 against our target of \$352,457. This could bring us a potential refund of \$280,751 should all commitments be honored. Your sacrificial generosity is greatly appreciated; I know that the good Lord will shower you with blessings!

LIVING ROSARY

October 13 at 6:30pm

St. Andrew Parish will again be having a Living Rosary. The purpose of the rosary is to help us meditate on the great mysteries of our salvation. In a Living Rosary, volunteers serve as a living bead of the Rosary and that person leads the prayer for that bead. 61 volunteers are needed to represent the beads of the Rosary and read the prayers. Volunteers will be accepted on a first come basis until all spaces are filled. Once the quota is reached, all others will be invited to sit in the pews and pray along with the rosary. Families are encouraged to attend. Volunteers will be holding a battery operated candle to illuminate the rosary. Children will also receive a small gift to commemorate our celebration. Saint John XXIII—Born of a farming family in northern Italy in 1881, Angelo Giuseppe Roncalli was ordained a priest in 1904. While in the seminary, he joined the Secular Franciscan Order. After his ordination in 1904, Fr. Roncalli returned to Rome for canon law studies. He soon worked as his bishop's secretary, Church history teacher in the seminary, and as publisher of the diocesan paper.

His service as a stretcher-bearer for the Italian army during World War I gave him a firsthand knowledge of war. In 1921, Fr. Roncalli was made national director in Italy of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith. He also found time to teach patristics at a seminary in the Eternal City.


In 1925, he became a papal diplomat, serving first in Bulgaria, then in Turkey, and finally in France. During World War II, he became well acquainted with Orthodox Church leaders. With the help of Germany's ambassador to Turkey, Archbishop Roncalli helped save an estimated 24,000 Jewish people.

A month short of entering his 78th year, Cardinal Roncalli was elected pope, taking the name John after his father and the two patrons of Rome's cathedral, St. John Lateran. Pope John took his work very seriously but not himself. His wit soon became proverbial, and he began meeting with political and religious leaders from around the world.

His most famous encyclicals were *Mater et* Magistra [Mother and Teacher (1961)] and *Pacem in Terris* [Peace on Earth (1963)]. Pope John XXIII enlarged the membership in the College of Cardinals and made it more international. At his address at the opening of the Second Vatican Council, he criticized the "prophets of doom" who "in these modern times see nothing but prevarication and ruin." Pope John XXIII set a tone for the Council when he said, "The Church has always opposed… errors. Nowadays, however, the Spouse of Christ prefers to make use of the medicine of mercy rather than that of severity."

"Good Pope John" died of stomach cancer on June 3, 1963. Saint John Paul II beatified him in 2000, and Pope Francis canonized him in 2014. His feast day, October 11, recalls the day of the first session of the Second Vatican Council (1962).

CHRIST HOPE IN EVERY SEASON OF COMMENT O

Each October the Church in the United States celebrates **Respect Life Month**, and the first Sunday of October is observed as **Respect Life Sunday**. During the month of October, the Church asks us to reflect more deeply on the dignity of every human life.

As part of our efforts to build a culture of life at St. Andrew, the bulletin will feature information about a range of different pro-life issues each week. We will also have a **Respect Life Month resource table in the Narthex**, which will feature prayers, reflections, and action items related to each week's pro-life theme, **so check back after every weekend Mass in October!**

October 5th & 6thA Consistent Ethic of Life: Abortion, Euthanasia, and the Death Penalty

What does it mean to be "pro-life"? In contemporary political discourse, the term "pro-life" is used synonymously with the term "anti-abortion".

But from the perspective of **Catholic Social Teaching**, being "pro-life" means promoting a **consistent ethic of dignity and life** rooted in the Gospel message to protect the lives of all vulnerable people. For the Church, there is no distinction between defending human life and promoting the dignity of the human person; every issue involving human life is interdependent and part of a systemic vision of life.

The life and dignity of every person must be respected and protected at every stage and in every condition. The right to life is the first and most fundamental principle of human rights that leads Catholics to actively work for a world of greater respect for human life and greater commitment to justice and peace.

Our attitude towards the unborn is inseparable from our attitude toward the pregnant woman without healthcare, the migrant at the border who left the land of her birth rather than join in gang activity, the prisoner on death row, the victim of trafficking, the teenager whose life is cut short because of the east of access to firearms, the hungry child, the communities living under bombs and in war, the environment on which we all depend for survival, and all who are vulnerable. They are in actual danger of death. As people of faith who oppose those who would take the life of a human embryo, we must also oppose everything that diminishes the life or dignity of any individual regardless of the circumstances.










The Church is especially concerned about abortion, euthanasia, and the death penalty as many in our society claim they have a legal right to end a life before birth, when someone is thought to be terminally ill, or as punishment for a crime. Abortion and Euthanasia are especially reprehensible as they target life at its most vulnerable and disproportionately affect the poor and people of color.

For people committed to upholding the sanctity of human life, the need to respect and protect innocent human life is clear. For some, however, issues like the death penalty may seem less clear. But we must also remember, that the imposition of capital punishment involves the possibility of an unjust conviction, especially within "a society which bears in its psychological, social, and economic patterns the marks of racism. These marks remain long after the demolition of segregation as a legal institution. The end result of all this is a situation in which those condemned to die are nearly always poor and are disproportionately black. Thus 47% of the inmates on Death Row are black, whereas only 11% of the American population is black."

Christ came to liberate us from the cycle of violence by showing us how to love and be merciful. As reflected in his life and teaching, as well as in saints' lives throughout history, "the antidote to violence is love, not more violence." As the culture of death threatens to electively select who does and who does not deserve life, we must uphold that all human life has invaluable dignity and worth.

When we feel that sin and evil are overwhelming, we must not be afraid. Jesus Christ has already conquered sin and death, and we know that his is the ultimate victory. Let us work to defend the dignity of all human life, made in the image and likeness of God, through prayer, education, and advocacy. Be not afraid; God is with us.



Who's Your Catechist?

Teresa Hurst is one of our amazing 8th grade catechists. She has been a catechists for about 27 years in total, with 19 of those years being at St. Andrew. She started teaching as a young person, took a brief hiatus after having her two eldest children, and then has been teaching ever since. Teresa especially loves working with teens. She starts the year by talking to them about taking on their Catholic faith for themselves—not because Mom and Dad are making them, but because they choose to live it and belong to our tremendous Catholic Church on their own. "It is not my job to do this perfectly I am not the one reaching them. I can let go of any pressure or the discouragement I create in my mind of "flawless teaching" and knowledge. It's not me who will reach them anyway! It is all God. Through the Holy Spirit alone I am only planting seeds; He is responsible for the watering."

Teresa says that she doesn't have a particular favorite moment, but says the best times are when the class gets on some "side topic" and the students are all engaged and throwing out question after question—and trying to understand for themselves their Catholic faith. "When the Holy Spirit is moving in the classroom, I can really feel that enthusiasm and in the evening, walking back home after class, I can feel that Jesus is pleased. I FOR SURE don't do it perfectly, but He is pleased with my imperfect attempts, and there is no greater satisfaction to be had in life than those moments you know you are united to Him."

Teresa understands that we are called to serve, that we must give back. For her, sharing her faith with young people has been her way of doing that. When she feels discouraged, overrun by doubts and worries about being a catechist, she turns to the Blessed Mother, who wraps her in the mantle of her grace and protection, and she leads Teresa to her Son and she hides in His Sacred Heart. And through the years the highs far outnumber the lows.

The road we walk each day is the road to Emmaus. Luke 24:13-35 Are we too busy on our journey to see Christ journeying alongside us?





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
