Parish Mission Statement

On The Advent Journey

+Adventus in Latin means to await the arrival of someone or something of great importance. For Christians, this season is very much identified with preparations for the birth of Christ, so much so that the second meaning of Advent is often diminished, that of preparing for the Second Coming of Christ in glory. The readings that begin the Advent season capture that second meaning more than the first. Isaiah was prophesying at a particularly dark time for Israel and Judah. It was nearly eight centuries before the coming of the Messiah. The chosen people were under attack from the Assyrians marching from their capital city Nineveh in the north. What was to follow would be a long period of war, exile and bloodshed. To shine a light into this darkness, Isaiah was given a message of hopefulness to help God's people keep the faith during their time of affliction

Wars will end, the suffering will give way once more to glory, when swords would become plowshares and spears would be pruning hooks. Jerusalem will be restored, the Temple rebuilt and *all nations shall stream toward it*. Isaiah was given a double prophecy – the people would return to their land in the near future, but in the distance, God promised to bring them to the new and heavenly Jerusalem where it will be *established as the highest mountain and raised above the hills*. It is quite simply the hope of heaven, and in the Savior who will bring it about. Armed with that powerful hope, Isaiah tells his countrymen: *Let us walk in the light of the Lord!*

When Paul wrote to the Christians at Rome, for them it was also a time of darkness and uncertain futures. The Church was being persecuted in its infancy, something Paul knew well as he himself was once the cause of the Christians' pain. Like Isaiah, Paul points to a brighter future for those who endure the cross – they will one day wear the crown of righteousness.


He encourages the Christians at Rome to throw off the works of darkness and put on the armor of light because our salvation is nearer now than when we first believed. The same can be said for us today. Our suffering is earthly, but our hope is eternal. Advent calls us to put on the Lord Jesus Christ and let Him guide us to himself and to the kingdom.

In our Gospel from Matthew, Jesus is also facing a time of testing and challenge. It is Wednesday of Holy Week. He will soon experience betrayal and abandonment and will be put on trial, sentence to die and led out to the cross. He knew the hour of his passing, the means by which it would occur, and by whose hand the deed would be committed. We, however, do not receive that same knowledge: *for you* (continued on page 3)

OUR NEW LOOK

In partnership with the New Evangelization, we are pleased to share with you our new logo to help identify who we are as a Catholic Parish.

- The color Gold symbolizes the Kingship of Jesus.
- The color Red signifies the blood poured out by Jesus for our salvation, and the Holy Spirit which draws us into the Cross to become more like Christ.
- The curved lines that draw us into the Cross image correspond with the curved architecture of the Bell Tower and tie in with the Church roof beams. The lines also flow out symbolically into the community as we minister to others to "Unleash the Gospel."
- The small "X" represents the Cross of Saint Andrew, our Patron Saint.

do not know on which day your Lord will come. Therefore, Jesus admonishes all to be awake and alert, preparing for the end of our lives, the end of the world and his second coming in glory. We must learn from those in Scripture and throughout history who did nothing to prepare themselves.

Jesus wants us to use the Advent season wisely, not only to prepare for the coming of Christmas, but with prayer, penance, and longing for God, to prepare for the coming of Christ - as a baby and as a king. What WILL we - you and I - do with this time of anticipation...?

+While it might seem a bit early, I do wish all of you a "happy new year" as we enter into another liturgical year for our journey as Church! This year, we move into the "A" cycle of readings for our Sunday celebrations (in which we will hear more from the Gospel of Matthew), and into "cycle II" for our weekday readings at Mass. As we start this Advent season, may the hope that comes to us shine brightly throughout not just the coming year, but always!

+This is one of those "early deadline" articles due to the Thanksgiving holiday, which will be passed as you read today's bulletin.... So, by now, I hope you have received our St. Andrew Parish Christmas card, which includes all the key celebrations and related events for this holiday season. Please keep it posted for ready reference, and save you from having to call the offices for dates and times, etc. But keep it, too, as a reminder to pray for our parish family in a special way at this time of year!

+We pray to honor our patron saint, Andrew, whose feast day we celebrate this weekend on Saturday, November 30. Andrew was one of the original 12 apostles, bringing his brother Peter to an encounter with the Lord that forever changed his life. Let us pray that our Patron St. Andrew reach out and help us in encountering Jesus and spreading his Good News among the various people we meet in our daily lives.

+I am grateful for our CSA support that so many of you have committed to this year! As of now, we have pledges/donations of \$689,058 against our target of \$352,457, which could end up generating a refund of \$336,601 back for our use here at St. Andrew. Some of this money has already been returned and been used for special upgrades to our sound system (linking all the spaces, including the new additions) and the new phone systems for the church facilities. Your generosity will be blessed by the Lord in many, many ways I am sure!

The building efforts continue, with various inspections taking place and minor issues being worked on and or corrected if necessary. We have done an extensive "punch list" of corrections, touch-ups, and fixing up any "oops" that might have occurred during construction. We anxiously await our final certificate of occupancy so we can move full throttle into the new space – so keep the project in your prayers.

+As we begin this new year, and as we move (soon) into our new spaces, and as we prepare to move more boldly into "Unleashing the Gospel" here at the parish, you might have taken notice of the new logo and banner head that comes with our bulletin this week. It incorporates the winning design suggestion from the parish regarding a renewed and new effort of moving on our journey of faith! You will start to see the new logo on our parish stationery and envelopes and the like. I thank our Marketing Committee and the Stewardship Commission for their leadership (and patience!) with this work!

+It is good to be back from a quick, short trip to Florida, to get some much needed rest before the busy season that awaits us all. I look forward to being with you on our journey through this beautiful season of Advent. May the Holy Spirit enkindle in us the fire of God's call to love and serve one another! See you in church!

Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary

A feast called the Conception of Mary arose in the Eastern Church in the seventh century. It came to the West in the eighth century. In the 11th century it received its present name, the Immaculate Conception. In the 18th century it became a feast of the universal Church. It is now recognized as a solemnity.

In 1854, Pius IX solemnly proclaimed: "The most Blessed Virgin Mary, in the first instant of her conception, by a singular grace and privilege granted by almighty God, in view of the merits of Jesus Christ, the savior of the human race, was preserved free from all stain of original sin."

The Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception, the patronal feast of Argentina, Brazil, Korea, Nicaragua, Paraguay, the Philippines, Spain, Uruguay, and the United States, is a Holy Day of Obligation. This feast honors Mary, the Mother of God, and celebrates the Immaculate Conception of the Virgin Mary. The Immaculate Conception refers to the conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary in the womb of Saint Anne.

The Immaculate Conception is celebrated on December 8. An important date in salvation history, this holiday is never abrogated even when December 8 falls on a Saturday or a Monday. However, if December 8 falls on a Sunday, as it does this year, the celebration of the Immaculate Conception is transferred to Monday, December 9. This is because Sundays in Advent take precedence over any other feast. When the celebration is transferred, rather than naturally falling on a Monday, the obligation to attend Mass does not transfer with it.


Andrew, like his brother Simon Peter, was a fisherman. He became a disciple of St. John the Baptist, but when John pointed to Jesus and said, "Behold the Lamb of God!" Andrew understood that Jesus was greater. At once he left John to follow the Divine Master. Jesus knew that Andrew was walking behind him, and turning back, he asked, "what do you seek?" When Andrew answered that he would like to know where Jesus lived, Our Lord replied, "Come and see." Andrew had been with Jesus only a little time when he realized that this was truly the Messiah.

From then on, he chose to follow Jesus. Andrew was thus the first disciple of Christ. Next, Andrew brought his brother Simon (St. Peter) to Jesus and Jesus received him, too, as His disciple. At first the two brothers continued to carry on their fishing trade and family affairs, but later, the Lord called them to stay with Him all the time. He promised to make them fishers of men, and this time, they left their nets for good. It is believed that after Our Lord ascended into Heaven, St. Andrew went to Greece to preach the gospel. He is said to have been put to death on a cross, to which he was tied, not nailed. He lived two days in that state of suffering, still preaching to the people who gathered around their beloved Apostle.



HELP Needed for Operation Sunshine Christmas Party on Sat., Dec. 7, 2019



Prayer Corner—Prayer 101

Prayer as God's Gift—continued...

What is your approach to prayer? Here we continue to look to the Catechism of the Catholic Church to deepen our knowledge of prayer. I underlined below what stood out to me. Please continue to ponder what stands out for you, and discern how you can form a deeper relationship with God through prayer.

"If you knew the gift of God!" The wonder of prayer is revealed beside the well where we come seeking water: there, Christ comes to meet every human being. It is he who first seeks us and asks us for a drink. Jesus thirsts; his asking arises from the depths of God's desire for us. Whether we realize it or not, prayer is the encounter of God's thirst with ours.

God thirsts that we may thirst for him. (CCC 2560)

"You would have asked him, and he would have given you living water."

Paradoxically our prayer of petition is a response to the plea of the living God:

"They have forsaken me, the fountain of living waters, and hewn out cisterns for themselves, broken cisterns that can hold no water!"

<u>Prayer is the response of faith to the free promise of salvation</u> and also a response of love to the thirst of the only Son of God. (CCC 2561)
