From Fr. Tom

Happy Easter Season to all!

The readings for this Sunday serve as a reminder that so much of our faith isn't individual. It is looking out for one another, praying for one another, praying with one another.

It is communal.

Look at the scriptures from Easter onward. Christ didn't appear to his followers one by one. The encounters with the resurrected Jesus all happened in groups: the two women at the tomb; the many disciples gathered in the upper room; and the two disciples traveling on the road to Emmaus. That last meeting leads not only to communion – the breaking of the bread – but to a deepening desire, a need, to spread the news to the community of believers. The disciples who met Christ couldn't continue on their way, they couldn't just pick up where they left off on the path they'd been following. They had to go back and tell others.

So much of the resurrection story is about telling the story of the road to Emmaus – spreading the word.

I know, you might say because of the pandemic we cannot come to church, we cannot celebrate physically be present together in the church and break the bread, BUT we can still spread the message, we can still tell others that Jesus is alive, that He is the Lord of the whole Universe, that he conquered death so He can conquer COVID 19 as well, that nothing is impossible for Him. Use your phone, use the internet, use different kinds of communicators and share Jesus' message of Hope with others! Do not stop being joyful missionary disciples even during this difficult time.

The good news that He is Risen has to be shared even now, or especially now!

I came across the following reflection in preparation for this weekend's readings. I wanted to share it, as the message at the end is so true for us today as we continue to navigate this Coronavirus, Jesus is on the journey with us and in that we should have great hope and comfort.

Gospel Reflection for the 3rd. Sunday of Easter-Jesus walks with us

This Sunday we experience another appearance of the risen Lord to two of his friends and followers.

These two disciples are walking to Emmaus. They are leaving Jerusalem and have their back to place where their dreams were shattered. They have just experienced the betrayal, denial, condemnation and death of their close friend, Jesus. As they walk along, they are talking about all the events that have just happened. Perhaps they are asking each other, 'Where did it all go wrong?' Why did we put so much hope and trust into this man called Jesus? And so, with a sense failure and disappointment they leave Jerusalem.

As they carry on their journey a stranger comes alongside them and asks them a simple and polite question; 'What are you talking about as you walk along?' They ask if he is the only one who does not know all things that have happened in Jerusalem. Again, this stranger asks them another question; 'What things? He is interested in all the things that have happened to them. As they walk and talk, the stranger simply listens to them. He wants to hear their story. Only when they have told him all the things that have happened to them does reveal his identity; he is the Risen Lord! Their eyes and hearts are opened at they listen to him speak and when see him at the breaking of the bread.

Third Sunday of Easter

In St. Luke's Gospel, the evangelist shares how, on the day of His Resurrection, Jesus encounters two of His disciples on their way to Emmaus. While He opens their hearts to the messianic passages that refer to Him in the Scriptures, they do not realize it is Christ until He breaks bread with them that evening. In this encounter, Jesus lays down the basic format of the Mass we celebrate today: Liturgy of the Word, a homily (Jesus' explanation of the Scriptures), and the Liturgy of the Eucharist (breaking of bread with these disciples). In the Acts of the Apostles and his First Letter, Peter likewise encourages us to acknowledge Jesus as our Savior. As Christian stewards, where do we meet our Lord? Our most significant encounter is in the Eucharist. In partaking of Holy Communion, we receive Jesus truly present, Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity. We can also encounter our risen Lord and Savior through attending Eucharistic Exposition and Benediction

On the Road to Emmaus

Imagine how the followers of Jesus must have felt that Saturday, after they had witnessed their friend and Lord dying on the cross the day before. They were certainly sad, bewildered, anxious, maybe even angry. They expected Jesus to be with them longer. They were left thinking, "Well, now what?" Perhaps they forgot the part about resurrection on the third day. All hope seemed lost.

On the road to Emmaus after the resurrection, two disciples excitedly talked about all the events which occurred, when Jesus approached and walked with them. They didn't realize at first who was in their midst. But they welcomed him and invited him to sit down and eat with them, just as Jesus taught. It was when Jesus broke the bread that their eyes were opened, and they recognized him.

A reflection in my Holy Week readings reminded me that all of our Good Fridays, the struggles in our lives, are followed by resurrection. When hope seems lost, we can open our eyes to the presence of God who helps us make sense out of the mess, just like the disciples in today's Gospel.

The reality of Covid19 presents many struggles. People are in isolation. Those who must work, such as those in health care and food service, are very vulnerable. When we or those around us experience a loss, we are not able to gather to personally provide comfort. But I have also seen positive aspects of this current situation. Family, friends and neighbors seem to check in on each other often and are more connected than ever before. People are protecting themselves and others by wearing masks and practicing social distancing.

We must be Jesus for each other in the world today. May your Easter season be filled with resurrection moments!


