Parish Mission Statement

On the Journey

+As we move back into ordinary time and green vestments/decorations, we also find ourselves having some very special feasts ("solemnities") on these Sundays to remind us of important aspects and beliefs of our faith. Today is one of those special days: the solemnity of The Most Holy Trinity.

The greatest love story of all time is the story of our salvation. God, despite all our sins, has such great love for us that He is unwilling to leave us in our sinfulness. And as today's Gospel reminds us, He was willing to sacrifice his only Son so that we might be raised from the death of sin and come to share in his life of communal love. This solemnity celebrates that life of communal love. For God is one God, in three persons – Father, Son, and Holy Spirit – whose relationship is one of complete self-gift and outpouring of love. In other words, God is not a being who loves; God *is love itself!*

That God is greater than we can ever know and yet is also one who revealed himself to us in his Son is truly something to celebrate. For the God who is transcendent – above all things – is also immanent: present to all things. He invites us to relationship with Him; to seek more and know more and to open our hearts and minds to how He reveals himself to us.

So today's celebration is actually a double celebration; we celebrate what God has revealed and we accept the invitation to know Him more, and to find joy and fulfillment in that knowing.

As the fundamental mystery of faith, it permeates our identity and prayer. Think of how at Mass we invoke the Trinity in several ways: from the initial sign of the cross to the Gloria to the opening prayer (which is addressed to the Father but offered through Jesus Christ in the unity of the Holy Spirit...one God, forever and ever. Then we profess our creed which sets out what we believe about the oneness of God, and yet a God who is Father, Son, and Spirit. And, of course, in the central act of the Mass, we will ask the Father to send the Spirit so that our bread and wine might become for us the Body and Blood of Christ, his Son. Our faith is Trinitarian!

Here we have three divine persons who in the words of the creed are "consubstantial" — eternal — each to be adored and glorified, and yet, one God. Within the Trinity there is such a perfect relationship that they are fully united in every way — no boundaries or separations except that they are not the same person. Everything that belongs to one belongs to the other, and yet each is not the same as the other.

By celebrating the Trinity, we recall God's invitation to us to be in relationship with Him. We are reminded that God loves each of us and wills only our good; that this love is so real that Christ was actually willing to die for us; and that the Spirit is the gift of the Father and the Son to us, to remain present among us. The Holy Spirit teaches and reminds us of that Trinitarian love, strengthening and consoling us in

times of challenge and trial, and empowering us to be disciples in a troubled world. That is why we call upon the Holy Spirit in a special way to help each one of us "unleash the Gospel" in the unique ways that you and I might be called to do so – all working together to build up the body of Christ, his Church here on earth.

If we are being honest, we will never fully know – in this world – how and why God loves us so much or why He has chosen to make us his sons and daughters. So let us today just simply revel in that divine love and that holy identity. Let it flow over us like a great wave – empowering us to live as faithful disciples in this time and place!

+On Pentecost, the Archbishop announced that there would be a complete renewal of structures of our parishes in the Archdiocese to make them radically "mission-oriented" in line with the unfolding of the Synod 16 goal of truly changing our activities from maintenance-oriented to mission-oriented. Our goal is to make our parishes places where individuals and families can encounter Jesus anew, grow as disciples, and be equipped to be witnesses to the risen Lord.


The current health and economic crises have accelerated the process of renewing the way our parishes are organized and structured. It is clear that we need a new model for going on mission that takes into account the reduced material resources we have, as well as the increasing shortage of priests.

Over the next two years, all parishes of the AoD will join other parishes in new groupings called "families of parishes." Families of parishes are groups of parishes, generally 3 to 6, sharing resources to advance the mission, including having multiple priests and deacons serving the family of parishes. This new model will allow the priests, deacons, and lay staff associated with each parish to better share their gifts and talents with the whole family of parishes.

This will be a significant change of the way our parishes are currently structured, but a necessary step in our missionary transformation. Just like the early Church and the missionary activity of the early apostles, the transition to this new structure will require cooperation with the Holy Spirit, a spirit of collaboration and innovation, and confidence in God who continues to lead us in our mission to unleash the Gospel in our part of the vineyard. It is putting into place a plan to continue unleashing the Gospel despite their being fewer resources available – both human and material. And instead of waiting till the situation becomes a "crisis," the approach we wish to take is to plan and move forward into a dynamic, thought-out, and enriching environment in which we can live and spread the faith!

Will this all happen at once? Certainly not, but I want you all to be aware of what is going on with our local church in Detroit. The church was/is already facing many challenges, including a shortage of priests, and given the current pandemic, the time-table for this kind of forward planning just seemed to make sense for us to tackle over the next couple years. I will make sure that our community here at St. Andrew is kept abreast of where we are heading....and help us actively participate in the planning for our future as Church, as missionary disciples for Jesus! (I guess I also tell you this since I am on one of the committees to plan on how to do the "mission-support" elements of such a plan!) May the Holy Spirit continue to guard and guide us on our journey!

- +This coming week, our people in RCIA will finally celebrate their sacraments of initiation! (Yeah!) Please keep them all in your prayers as they join us on a journey of a lifetime. I thank Susan Kowalski and her leadership under such difficult circumstances this year, and the entire staff for helping our brothers and sisters in coming to know more about the Lord and his Catholic Church.
- +Well we made it back into church finally! Amen, Alleluia! As Fr. Tom mentioned, Pentecost was an appropriate day to re-open the church for weekend liturgy. For the most part, things went pretty smooth; it might just take a little time to get used to things. And as our "lived experience" under the different conditions we have pointed out, there might be a need for some modifications to how things are being handled. I thank you for your cooperation, especially with wearing a mask and social distancing appropriately. Let us know of any suggestions to help matters; contact Nikki with helpful ideas. Your continued financial support will help us keep things going in the areas of payroll and bills, so I encourage your sacrificial giving during this time as much as possible!
- +My health improvements are moving ever-so-slowly, but in the right direction. I can't tell you how many doctors I am seeing, and it is a challenge at times to juggle ever-changing "virtual appointments!" I had one doctor just give up on them and tell us all that we need to make an appointment to see him live and in person! I like that, but it can be difficult in arranging rides and multiple other meetings. Hopefully with HFRS closed for the summer, it will be a bit easier now. I am sorry for the length of my article this week, but I wanted to make sure that the word is getting out about the "families of parishes" that the Archbishop announced on Pentecost. I don't want anyone to think something is going on covertly in the local Church of Detroit. My prayerful gratitude for your prayers, meal preparations, etc. during this time!!God bless you all!
- +May the Holy Spirit continue to guard and watch over us every step of the journey. May our Mother Mary, Blessed Solanus Casey, and our patron St. Andrew help us all on our journey through this time of challenge and uncertainty. I look forward to seeing you in church!



Holy Trinity

The Holy Trinity is hailed by the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* as "the central mystery of the Christian faith". Trying to explain or even understand it fully is impossible. However, today's Scriptures place us squarely in the midst of the mystery. If we listen with our hearts we end up with a very personal portrait of God. Pope St. John Paul II retrieved the notion of the Holy Trinity as a

Divine Family. The teaching on the Divine Family presents God as a family, Father to Son, and Son to Father, and the Holy Spirit as the Love between them. As in a marriage, the love between two spouses brings forth life in a child, so the Holy Trinity exists as this Love between the Father and Son. As three family members are equal in dignity, so the Persons of the Holy Trinity are equal in divinity and splendor. This idea may cause some discomfort for theologians, but the help it provides in explaining and applying the Holy Trinity outweighs the debate. As St. Patrick went with the three-leaf clover even with its, so the use of the Divine Family can serve a broader cause today.



Reminders as we return to Church

Those 65 and older or with compromised health conditions or caring for the sick in any way are encouraged to remain at home. The dispensation from the Sunday obligation to attend Mass is granted to all the faithful through Sunday, September 6, 2020. As an act of justice to the whole community if you are not feeling well, have a fever, cough, etc. STAY HOME.

- 1. Wear a face covering/mask All of the faithful are reminded that those 2 and over MUST have a face covering from the time that they leave their vehicle until they return to their vehicle, with the exception of when they receive communion.
- Follow Social distancing Please make sure that you maintain a six foot distance between yourself and others. Follow the directions of those who are seating you. Do not congregate before or after Mass.
- 3. Distribution of Communion Receiving in the hands is highly recommended. Use of personal hand sanitizer



May 30: Letter from Archbishop Vigneron Regarding the Death of George Floyd

On May 29, Archbishop Vigneron wrote to the Black Catholic community to share his prayers for them and assure them of his solidarity in the wake of the death of George Floyd in Minneapolis, MN.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Over the past two months, I have witnessed with sorrow the effect the current pandemic has had particularly on the black community here in the Archdiocese of Detroit. It has been painful to hear daily of how the virus is impacting pastors, parish staff, and friends and family of the faithful here, and of the ensuing fear and anxiety that has followed in its wake since. And now, compounding this suffering is – as one of the faithful put it to me – that "deep, familiar, and soul-crushing ache" which the death of George Floyd has reawakened. I know that while physically distant, the events in Minneapolis have cut deep into existing wounds held close to your own hearts.

With this in mind, I wanted to offer a brief but sincere re-assurance and expression of solidarity in our Catholic community. St. Paul preached: God has put this body together, so that "there may be no division in the body, but that the parts may have the same concern for one

another. If one part suffers, all the parts suffer with it; if one part is honored, all the parts share its joy" (1 Cor. 12:25-26). Admittedly, this solidarity has not always been perfect — as I shared two summers ago in my pastoral note on racism, we are living the wounds of many years of injustice in our local communities. But like all things in the Christian life, when we turn to Him, all can be made perfect in Christ. So, I want to acknowledge your suffering, to bring it into the light, so that we all together as a Catholic Church community can bring these wounds we share in Christ, to Christ for healing.

I hope, too, that you will join me in praying for two additional petitions at this time. First and foremost is for a blessed repose for George Floyd, and for comfort for his grieving family and friends. Second is for peace, both in our communities and in our own hearts.

Entrusting you to the intercession of Blessed Solanus Casey, I am



TRINITY SUNDAY

Most of us enjoy a good mystery. When I was young I loved to read Nancy Drew. I'd climb up into the apple tree in my backyard and read for hours, letting Nancy untangle all the mysteries that came her way. I still like to guess who-done-it in the mysteries I read today.

The Trinity is a great mystery in our church. The pre-fix "tri" gives us a clue that the number three is important, and the rest of the word points to unity. Every time we make the sign of the cross we are reminded of the three persons in one God. At Baptism, the celebrant uses the same words as water is poured.

To help children understand the concept of the Trinity a little better, we use visuals of items that have three parts, such as an apple, an egg, or a shamrock. We can also think about a group hug, which we are all in need of at this time in history. If you are able, get three family members together and embrace one another. Three persons, one unit. (And pray that we can hug other family and friends soon.)

The sign of the cross is a short but powerful prayer in our faith tradition. It affirms what we believe about God even though, in our humanness, we can't quite fully understand. We can rest assured that God has all the answers even when we don't, and we can be thankful that God has given us the faith to believe. In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen!
