On the Journey

+Starting a bit differently too this weekend (following last weekend's modified approach to my article), I want to "officially" **welcome our new parochial vicar (technical name for our "associate"), Fr. Craig Marion**, who is coming to us from St. Paul on the Lake Parish! Of course, Fr. Craig is busy getting situated, unpacking, setting things up, but maybe he'll write for the bulletin in a week or two when things start to settle down a bit. We look forward to getting to know you, Fr. Craig. We will try to have some kind of more formal welcoming in the fall, by which time we hope and pray that things will be settled down even more with the current pandemic! **Again, Welcome Fr. Craig!**

+The image of a yoke is often lost on us in our modern culture. It's that wooden crosspiece that harnesses oxen and other beasts of burden and keeps them together as they plow a field or haul goods. In today's Gospel, it is the central image Jesus uses to invite us into union not just with Him, but with the Father and thus with the Holy Spirit.

No one knows the Father except the Son and anyone to whom the Son wishes to reveal Him. These words from Jesus indicate two things. First, only in Jesus do we find the fullness of all revelation of God. As the Catechism states: "in many and various ways God spoke of old to our fathers by the prophets, but in these last days, He has spoken to us by a Son' Christ, the Son of God made man, is the Father's one, perfect and unsurpassable Word. In Him He has said everything; there will be no other word than this one." (CCC65)

Second, Christ chooses to reveal the Father to us, and to mediate that experience and relationship by shining a light for our feet to follow, and by walking beside us in our journey. Therefore his instruction to all of us who are burdened and who labor – to come to Him, and to take his yoke upon ourselves – is meant to alert us to our being literally bound to Him, coupled to Him, so that He may help us pull and plow our way through the fields we walk. We can rest when we allow Him to manage that yoke and do the heavy work.

This is not another way of Him saying, "take up our cross and follow Him." While it is true that we must do that, in this case the message is that when we yoke ourselves to Christ – in baptism and through our life of faith and in the sacraments – grace abounds and there is more room for Christ to work in our lives; there is more room for Christ to lead the way and fewer opportunities for us to stumble over rocks in our path.

Jesus does not say we will no longer have struggles, but that we will find recourse in Him. His strength will be our strength, infusing us with trust and helping us place all our difficulties before Him. And when we commit ourselves to Him, we become

one with Him, with the Father whom He has revealed to us, and with the Holy Spirit who gives us the gift of faith – marked by the sign of the cross by which Christ claims us as his own.

We can look about this world and know that there are many who continue to walk alone. Bereft of hope, they mistakenly believe that to take Christ's yoke upon them means that they are somehow limiting their freedom. But it is just the opposite. Christ tells us his *yoke is easy* and *his burden light*. It is in Him, and the life of faith bound up with Him, that we find perfect freedom and the fullness of hope.

This is God's gracious will – that we may one day know the freedom of trusting Him completely and return to Him in his everlasting glory. In Jesus, He has given us the way, and this way is freely and humbly given. How truly blessed we are! What an invitation we have all received! May we seek to do God's will, and cooperate with the grace that will lead us on our journey to our heavenly home!

+Sorry for the confusion regarding a 9 a.m. mass on Saturday, July 4th. It was probably my fault in the necessary communications that need to go on with other staff that I caused when one conversation was that we would have a mass, and then other staff not being made aware. Send the blame to me!

+I started to receive some emails about CSA, and the parish also started receiving those CSA "reminder" envelopes in the collection/mail. I couldn't figure out "why" the emails. Putting it all together, it then dawned on me that many people thought we had *already done* a 2020 CSA, and somehow, they just overlooked it, maybe even slept through it! Not the case at all, my friends! We will be having a CSA effort later in August/beginning of September. As I have mentioned a couple times in some earlier bulletin articles, the target from the Archdiocese will be 15% less than last year (about \$302,000). However, most importantly, we need everyone to make a real sacrifice in giving to CSA as this is the third year of our "push" to help pay down the building project debt. So when the time comes, won't you please be as generous as you can be? Everything over the \$302K target will come back for us to use on the debt. And if you already submitted the envelope out of the offertory packet, don't be upset if you get the letter and another request in that August/September time frame. Working together, we can make a good "dent" in the debt of \$2,466K left on the building when we closed out the project in May of this year.

+I am so blessed by all the prayers that you have offered for my recovery!! This past week on Wednesday – too late to be included in this bulletin – I finally got in to see my G.I. doctor to get a better understanding of my colonoscopy procedure in May and what the diagnosis/prognosis might be for the future. Your continued prayers give me hope that my recovery will continue and I can soon join you back at the table of the Lord in church!

+New noises in the rectory, old ones gone – just a time for getting used to changes that come with summer and priestly assignment transitions! Please keep the priests in your prayers during this time.

+Work on the challenges of being a faithful person during this period of the pandemic, that you don't lose your faith. Ask for the grace to yoke yourself to the Lord...that He might guard and guide all of us along our journey to our heavenly Father. Enjoy the holiday weekend – safely!! God bless you!

Did I Miss CSA This Year?

As Monsignor mentioned in his article, NO you have not missed the Catholic Services Appeal 2020. Due to the pandemic, the Archdiocese decided to delay the start until late August / beginning September. Also, different this year will be the mailing. The mailing will be coming from the Archdiocese rather than the parish. They are still working out the details and the procedure.

So why the reminder envelope in our envelope packets? Believe it or not, the parish needs to set the upcoming envelope packets a year in advance. Hence, we were still thinking the CSA would have begun in May, and this would be the "last call" for trying to actively seek pledges for the CSA for the year.

Don't worry if you used the envelope in the packet. We, at the parish, are recording your donation and ensuring that it makes its way to the Archdiocese for recording purposes as well. We have been told that you should not receive another mailing from the Archdiocese, but there may be a lapse between their mailing and their recording of your gift. If you have concerns, please call the parish office at 248.651.7486 and we will be happy to look into it.

4 Worship

Last Sunday morning, I had the opportunity to hear Fr. Kosanke's homily that was given in the televised Mass produced by the Archdiocese. His words of prioritizing our lives with God first, others second, and self last stayed with me throughout the day. When I was challenged later that day about wearing masks at Church and having to limit capacity, I began to once again reflect on the responsibility of Catholics to care for the common good. Having previously spent many years in youth ministry working with teens on mission trips, I spent a fair amount of time discussing our role in living out this mission and what our rights and responsibilities are as Catholics.

I think at times we are quick to approach items that are put in place for the good of all as an affront to our personal freedom, but what does it really mean to be free in the context of Catholic teaching? The Catechism of the Catholic Church has a section on human freedom. "The more one does what is good, the freer one becomes," reads paragraph 1733. "There is no true freedom except in the service of what is good and just." Justice is all about strong, positive relationships between individual people and communities. Choices that show love for others — especially those who are most vulnerable — are instances of real freedom. On the other hand, choices rooted in a desire to do what I want, when I want it, without regard for how my decisions might impact others are not what freedom looks like. As paragraph 1738 of the catechism puts it, "Freedom is exercised in relationships between human beings."

The simple act of wearing a mask in public, this small sacrifice, can be a profound act of freedom oriented toward the good of others. With this sort of Gospel vision, what feels like a burden can be transformed into an opportunity for blessing. We wear masks to protect others because the vast majority of us don't know from day to day if we might be the contagious ones. It reflects our concern for the common good of our fellow men and women, and our hope that they have a similar concern for us. In thinking about the common good, we place ourselves firmly within the moral and social teachings of the Church, which in turn goes back to what Jesus taught: "Do to others whatever you would have them do to you. This is the law and the prophets" (Mt 7:12).

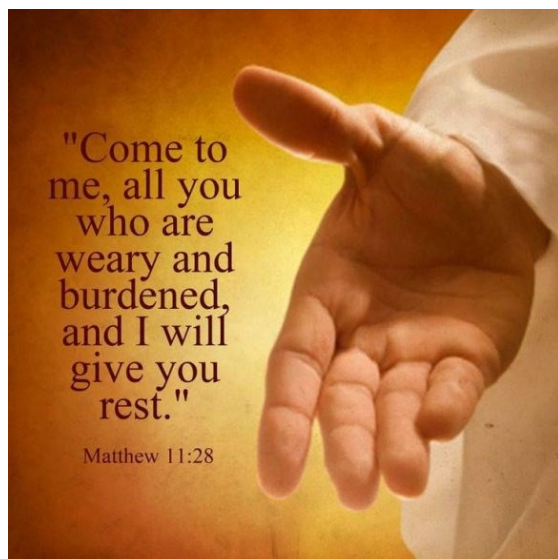

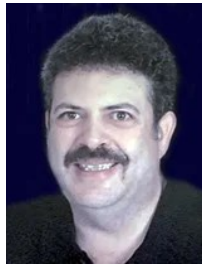

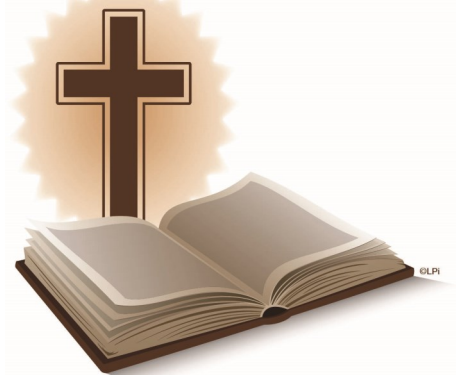
