On the Journey

+Many of us struggle to balance the demands of our life, especially in the current environment in which we live. How often do our conversations center on how busy we are and how much we have to do? Today's readings speak into that pressure, into that rush, into our often overextended lives.

Saint Paul asks the Romans: What will separate us from the love of Christ? Will anguish, or distress....or peril, or the sword? No, in all these things we conquer overwhelmingly through Him who loved us. Isaiah offers us a similar comfort: All you who are thirsty, come to the water! You who have no money, come, receive grain and eat; Come, without paying and without cost, drink wine and milk!

What are we hungry for? What do we thirst for? What are our deepest needs? The Lord tells us, come to the water! Drink and eat without cost. Receive Christ, whose love for you is stronger than death – stronger than present or future things, stronger than powers or any other creature.

If God is truly calling us to care for others, to participate in the work God is doing in the world, then He also desires to give us everything we need to do so. This means we must try to reject the urge to be constantly "doing," and instead root all our efforts in the truth that we are, first and foremost, infinitely loved by the One who created us.

We do not have to "earn" this love by doing more or better. We do not have to spend [our] money for what is not bread; [our] wages for what fails to satisfy. We need only to rely on the Lord. Listen to Him; heed his voice that we may have life and be renewed with the everlasting covenant.

As we approach the table of the Lord to receive Him in Holy Eucharist - the fulfillment of the covenant – let us remember to bring our needs and our hunger to Christ, especially in these times of the world's pandemic. Let us confidently seek the renewal Christ wants to offer us. Let us open our hearts to be nourished by his love so that we can feed those He calls us to serve.

It may be a daunting challenge at times, but with God's grace, anything is possible! May that help us to all realize how truly blessed we are!

+Starting this week of August 3rd, the church will be staying open a bit longer in the day (trying for 2 p.m. each weekday afternoon) for personal, private prayer. As mentioned last week in my article, please remember that we work hard at keeping the buildings sanitized for YOUR safety, and it is a time-consuming, tedious task. Should there be funerals, weddings or other liturgical events, you may be politely asked to leave so that process can occur (the sanitation spray can linger for a short bit in the air). Elsewhere in today's bulletin is a little summary to review the guidelines for these longer hours.

Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

We learn in today's Scripture passages from the Prophet Isaiah, Psalm 145, and St. Matthew's Gospel how God feeds His people both physically and spiritually. The evangelist St. Matthew tells the miracle of Jesus feeding the 5,000 — not counting women and children — from only five loaves of bread and two fish. This narrative is proclaimed in all four Gospels and foreshadows the Lord's tremendous gift of the Eucharist at the Last Supper. At every Mass, the priest, in the person of Christ, consecrates simple bread and wine into Jesus' true Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity. St. Paul, in his Letter to the Roman community, reminds us how inseparable God's love in Christ Jesus is from us. As disciples, faithful stewards acknowledge Christ's love through His Eucharistic gift as the "source and summit" of our spiritual strength, one that inspires us to evangelize and embrace stewardship as a way of life.



Today's first reading from Isaiah is packed with symbolism. Although it is only three short verses, each line can be unpacked and has a wealth of meaning, more than can be covered here. In this reading is an invitation. The nature of the invitation implies an urgency in the need to respond to the offer being given. The reader is invited to "come" four times within the short passage.

This offer is available to all, but has a qualifier, inviting all those who are thirsty. Thirst is a physical need and one cannot survive long without water. But, in this case the notion of thirst serves as a metaphor for the spiritual longings of people. Those who thirst are invited to the water. Water, the very thing that gives life, which we cannot survive without.

The invitation gets better inviting those without money to "receive grain and eat" to "drink wine and milk". This invitation is a gift freely given. There is no price set upon it because it is something that is beyond measure. Unlike today, where wine is often consumed at a meal, in biblical times, it was often used at special feasts or times of a celebratory nature. Milk, rich in nutrients is also symbolic of the life-giving offer being extended. Also featured in the passage is bread, another symbol of that which provides sustenance.

The question comes of why people are futilely wasting their time and money on things that leave them empty. The invitation is to listen. We listen to God's word and we are reminded of the benefits assured to David. Those who respond to the invitation, to the free offer of a relationship with God are assured that God will provide all that we need.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

Saint John Vianney

Feast day: August 4

Patron Saint of Priests



John Vianney, also known as the Holy Curé de Ars, was born May 8, 1786 in Dardilly, near Lyon, France to a family of farmers. He was ordained a priest in 1815 and became curate in Ecully. He was then sent to the remote French community of Ars in 1818 to be a parish priest.

Upon his arrival, the priest immediately began praying and working for the conversion of his parishioners. Although he saw himself as unworthy of his mission as pastor, he allowed himself to be consumed by the love of God as he served the people.

John Vianney died on August 4, 1859. Over 1,000 people attended his funeral, including the bishop and priests of the diocese, who already viewed his life as a model of priestly holiness.

The Holy Curé of Ars was canonized by Pope Pius XI in 1925.

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults and Children

How does one become Catholic?

Many Catholics are born into Catholic families and gradually come to share in the full Sacramental life of the Church. Others, previously baptized in other Christian Churches or never baptized, become Catholic through a process known as The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults. Children over the age of seven participate in a modified process, The Rite of Christian Initiation of Children. The Rites of Initiation of adults and children are the Catholic Church's way of initiating new members. At St. Andrew Parish we warmly welcome new members and attempt to provide an appropriate spiritual formation for each inquirer.

Who may participate?

Those never baptized as Christians. Those baptized in another Christian faith tradition now interested in the Catholic tradition. Those baptized in the Catholic tradition whose sacramental reception is not complete. Children over the age of seven who have not received the Sacraments of Baptism, First Eucharist or Confirmation.

How long is the process?

RCIA is not a class or a program but a process of conversion. It prepares one to embark on a journey of faith that leads to a lifelong commitment as a Catholic. All Catholics are called to daily conversion and renewal of our faith journey. RCIA stresses the need for a living experience of Church as a "people of God" and not just "knowledge" about the Church. A person's desire to turn toward God

(conversion) and become connected to a community does not happen instantaneously, but takes time as the Holy Spirit nurtures the deepening desire within. The usual length of preparation is approximately nine months to a year. In most cases, the initiation of new members is celebrated at the Easter Vigil.

Remember to Vote and Make Your Voice Heard

Primary Election Tuesday, August 4th

On Tuesday, August 4, Michigan will conduct primary elections to determine the major candidates that will square off in November. This year, due to the pandemic, voters are encouraged to vote from home with an absentee ballot. In-person voting will be available in every jurisdiction. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Make sure you return your ballot to your local clerk's office by 8pm on Aug. 4. Late ballots will not be recorded even if postmarked before the deadline. So be sure to mail your ballot early to avoid potential delayed postal delivery. Some city/township clerk's offices have drop boxes where you can place absentee ballots. Please visit www.michigan.gov/vote/ to register to vote, for more information on the candidates & how to vote from home, and to track your ballot.

In their statement on *Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship*, the U.S. Catholic bishops remind Catholics, "We are called to bring together our principles and our political choices, our values and our votes, to help build a better world" (no. 14). The bishops do not tell Catholics how to vote; the responsibility to make political choices rests with each person and his or her properly formed conscience, aided by prudence. As Catholics we are not single-issue voters. Authentic Discipleship requires Catholics to consider the entire range of life and dignity issues in any voting decision and to vote for the candidate who is most likely to advance the common good and the dignity of the human person.

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops offer the following policy goals as a guide Catholics as they form their consciences and reflect on the moral dimensions of their public choices:

- Address the preeminent requirement to protect human life—by restricting and bringing to an end the destruction of unborn
 children through abortion and providing women in crisis pregnancies with the supports they need. End the following practices:
 the use of euthanasia and assisted suicide to deal with the burdens of illness and disability; the destruction of human embryos
 in the name of research; the use of the death penalty to combat crime; and the imprudent resort to war to address
 international disputes.
- Achieve comprehensive immigration reform that offers a path to citizenship, treats immigrant workers fairly, prevents the separation of families, maintains the integrity of our borders, respects the rule of law, and addresses the factors that compel people to leave their own countries.
- Help families and children overcome poverty and ensure access decent work at fair, living wages and adequate assistance for the vulnerable in our nation, while also helping to overcome widespread hunger and poverty around the world.
- Provide health care while respecting human life, human dignity, and religious freedom in our health care system.
- Continue to oppose policies that reflect racism, hostility toward immigrants, religious bigotry, and other forms of unjust discrimination
- Establish and comply with moral limits on the use of military force—examining for what purposes it may be used, under what authority, and at what human cost— with a special view to seeking a responsible and effective response for ending the persecution of Christians and other religious minorities in the Middle East and other parts of the world.
- Join with others around the world to pursue peace, protect human rights and religious liberty, and advance economic justice and care for creation.

Catholic Teaching Affirms Dignity of Black Lives

The Detroit News published an op/ed from Michigan Catholic Conference on Monday, July 20, which challenges Catholics to "not shy away from Jesus' teaching to love God and neighbor" and to participate in efforts to eliminate the evil of racism. It is crucial in the current moment to reaffirm specifically the dignity of Black lives, especially those that have been lost to senseless acts of violence. To do so does not negate the fact that all lives have value. Instead, it speaks in a special way to the challenges that the Black community is facing, and recognizes that threats to any one community undermine the value of life for others.
