# On the Journey

+The Solemnity of All Saints commemorates all the saints of the Church – known and unknown to us – who have preceded us in death and attained respite in the kingdom of heaven. It also celebrates the bond between them and us, who seek that same union with God in heaven one day.

We are part of the communion of saints by our baptism. We are God's children now, John says in today's second reading. What we shall be has not yet been revealed. We do know that when it is revealed we shall be like Him (Christ) – for we shall see Him as He is.

Therefore, as brothers and sisters in the Lord, we should treat each other as such, making ourselves pure as Christ is pure. For it is precisely this hope of heaven that has strengthened countless Christians throughout the centuries to overcome heroic struggles, and many martyrs to hold fast to the faith.


The vision that John has in today's reading from the Book of Revelation is of that hope, realized in the light of faith. A great multitude, from every nation, race, people and tongue, arrayed themselves at the throne of the Lamb, and sang praises to God, worshiping Him and giving thanks. These are the saints who have gone before us who have survived the time of great distress; they have washed their robes and made them white in the Blood of the Lamb.

This multitude comprises our heavenly counterparts: People who were once here on earth, sinners just like us, whom God has chosen for himself and for heavenly happiness. They were able to achieve this exalted state not because they were great, but because God is greater. Through their repentance of sin, and God's just judgment and mercy, they have been purified and brought into the Kingdom.

Jesus promises this happiness that is, quite literally, out of this world. It can be found only in the next life, and the first to receive this joy were those who suffered so much sorrow and loss here on earth. This is the reward of faith and righteousness for the meek, the sorrowing, the hungry, and the persecuted. We do not worship saints. God alone be praised. We do, however, ask the saints to pray for us, that we might overcome our fears, faults, and failings, just as they did, by the grace of God. It has been said, there is no saint without a past, and no sinner without a future. Revelation assures us that the saints come from every walk of life, from the far and dark corners of this world; they emerge victorious in battle because Jesus has already won the war.

During this month of November, as we remember all the faithful departed, let us all draw attention to our final, transcendent goal – life with God for all eternity!

- +With All Saints liturgy this weekend, it brings to light our celebration for All Souls Day on Monday, November 2. We will have the regular morning mass at 9 a.m., and then the special Mass of Remembrance in the evening at 7 p.m. The Book of Life will also be out; please remember that you need NOT enter names from prior years which you have already placed into the book. Just those individuals who have passed away since last November. Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord!
- +With the election on Tuesday of this coming week, we will once again offer a time of quiet prayer and adoration of the Blessed Sacrament on Monday, immediately following mass to 10:30 a.m. With all the activity of the elections and the pandemic and upcoming holidays, maybe this would be a great opportunity to slow down the pace for just a bit and ask the Lord for guidance and protection.
- +We continue to be blessed with generosity with your CSA support! We have reached pledges/donations of \$438,490 against our target of \$302,657; should all of that be collected, we would have a refund of \$135,833 to go to our building loan/debt reduction. My prayerful thanks! I invite those who have yet to commit to please join the many who have so generously done so already!
- +This past week on Wednesday, we hosted pastors of all our vicariate parishes for another "Family of Parishes" planning meeting. We are moving forward on figuring out how and with whom we will become a "family" with. This will help parishes as we move into the future with planning for fewer priests as well as a greater number of faith offerings and opportunities! As things become more clearly identified, we will be able to make announcements and bulletin articles about how this will all unfold. Hopefully at the beginning of Advent, we will hear if our proposal of "family partners" will be accepted by the Archbishop; when decided upon, the families will be presented to all the parishes. Please pray that the Holy Spirit continues to guide the work of all the parishes and leaders in this project!
- +There is certainly a growing concern about the coronavirus lately, with the increases of the number of those diagnosed as infected over these past weeks. I am praying constantly about the whole matter, as I worry about another state shut-down and the effect it will have on the people of our great state of Michigan and of our local area and of course, how it will impact our parish and the Church locally. This has been taking a great personal toll on everyone; I pray that we all manage to hold up and weather this trial, asking Christ to help us carry this particular cross.



### **ALL SAINTS—A History**

While "saint" as a title is reserved to those whose lives the church has thoroughly investigated (typically through whose intercession two miracles can be demonstrated to have occurred), all in heaven are part of the communion of saints. The church commemorates all these saints on All Saints' Day.

The history of the feast reveals a great deal about the church's understanding of the communion of saints. The feast originated in the earliest centuries of the church, when Christians commemorated the many martyrs who died at the hands of their Roman persecutors. Because there were so many martyrs, they could not each have their own feast day; but they were seen as such important witnesses that the Christians did not want to leave any of them out. As a result, a single commemoration for "all the martyrs" was observed each spring.

In the early 7th century Pope Boniface IV consecrated the Pantheon in Rome, formerly a temple to all the gods, as a church dedicated to Saint Mary and the Martyrs, and ordered that that date, 13th May, should be celebrated every year.


In the 8<sup>th</sup> century, Pope Gregory III consecrated a chapel at St. Peter's Basilica to all the saints, with an anniversary date of Nov. 1. Rome adopted Nov. 1 as the date of the feast of All Saints in the eighth century, and in the ninth century Pope Gregory IV extended that observance to the whole of the Latin Church. The Orthodox Church celebrates All Saints' Day on the first Sunday after Passover - a date closer to the original 13th of May.

### **Book of Remembrance**

During the month of November, the Church in a special way remembers the faithful departed who have gone on to their eternal rest. In recognition of this, St. Andrew places our *Parish Book of Remembrance* out in the Church.

Parishioners are invited to write the names of their family members and friends who have passed away in the last year in during the month of November. All who are listed will be remembered in prayer. Names that have previously been entered <u>do not</u> need to be entered again.

During these unusual times you are encouraged to use your own pen or make use of the hand sanitizer prior to writing in the book.

# **All Saints**

Who are the saints, and how did they get to be saints? Saints lived human, ordinary lives, which were made extraordinary by their commitment to God.

Some saints were born saintly. Many were not. Saints were regular people who, with God's help, overcame weaknesses. St. Matthew, for example, was a tax collector, an unscrupulous occupation at that time, because they were allowed to exact money from citizens, as long as the government got their share. Jesus still called Matthew, and he turned his life around. Perhaps you've heard the saying, "All saints have a past, all sinners have a future." We are all capable of saintliness.

We can look to the saints as role models because they imitated the life of Jesus, the greatest role model. Jesus didn't come to solve the world's problems. He came to show us how to do it ourselves, through love. He gravitated toward sinners, and those most in need of healing. Like the saints, we can imitate the love Jesus showed. And when we serve like Jesus, we become a little more saintly.

Think about your favorite celebrity, from the sports world, music, the arts, the business world, etc. To get really good at what they do, they have to recognize the fundamentals of human excellence: define a goal, then develop habits to achieve that goal. That's what saintly people do.

One modern day saint who did just that was Mother Teresa, St. Teresa of Calcutta. Her goal was to love God with all her heart, and she allowed that to permeate all of her activities. She followed the example of St. Therese of Liseaux, who said, "There are no great deeds, only small deeds done with great love." Mother Teresa's gentle examples of love made a great difference in the world.

Fr. Solanus Casey is on the path to sainthood. He was a simple person, not all that smart, but he used the gifts God gave him to serve. He was beatified in November of 2017, the last step before canonization, which will make him a saint.


The Beatitudes (Matthew 5:1-12) in this week's Gospel, are teachings of Jesus that describe qualities and actions of people blessed by God. They give us a clear look at the rewards, or outcomes, of living them. It has been said that they are the ladder or steps the saints have taken to ascend to heaven. The beatitudes help us to live more like saints.

Since God chooses people who are obviously imperfect, we can have hope for ourselves. We are given the gifts we need to follow God's plan for us. God doesn't call the "qualified," he qualifies the called. That means we are made ready, through the gifts we have been given, to do God's work. As we discern our mission in life, we can choose goals based on that mission. We can make plans, work hard and count on God to be with us on our spiritual journey. We can choose saintliness!

# TODAY WE CELEBRATE THE FEAST OF ALL SAINTS Solemnity of All Saints, All Hallows' Day, Hallowmas

#### **KEY FACTS:**

- · All Saints' Day celebrates both known and unknown saints.
- · Saints are those who are believed to have reached heaven.
- It is a holiday rooted in the belief that the world is spiritually connected to heaven.
- All Saints' Day is considered a holy day of obligation, requiring Catholics to attend Mass.
- · It is celebrated on November 1 by the Roman Catholic Church
- It is the second part of Allhallowtide which lasts from October 31 to November 2. Hallow means "holy" in Old English.
- · All Saints' Day is not the same as All Souls' Day—All Souls' Day is dedicated to those who still have not reached heaven.

### SOME CUSTOMS AROUND THE WORLD:

- In Mexico, All Saints' Day lasts for one week. It falls on the first day of the Day of the Dead (Dia de los Muertos) celebration. Mexicans hold parades and festivals at this time.
- · In Portugal, children go door to door for candy on All Saints' Day.
- Throughout Europe, flowers are offered on graves.
- In Eastern Europe, instead of giving flowers, people light candles and clean the graves.
- In the Philippines and France, people restore and repaint the tombs of their loved ones.
- In an All Saints' Day feast, soul cakes and Irish bread with fruit are commonly served.

Michigan Catholic Conference (MCC) encourages Catholics and people of goodwill to participate in the upcoming November election, studying the ballot carefully and voting with a well-formed conscience. There are two statewide ballot proposals to consider in addition to a wide range of candidates at the federal, state, and local levels. In some areas of Michigan, there will also be local millages or ballot issues to consider.

<u>The Word from Lansing column from MCC for October</u> highlights the call for Catholics to weigh candidate positions on issues according to their moral importance, as not all issues bear the same moral weight on our consciences. The column also talks about the need to consider candidate positions on a wide range of issues important to the Church.

MCC's election webpage, <u>www.micatholic.org/2020Election</u>, offers a variety of resources to assist Catholics in the decision-making process.





# Participate in Civilize It This 2020 Election Cycle

The U.S. Catholic bishops have written that communities across the country benefit greatly when their members seek "to dismantle stereotypes and to build productive conversation" instead of to divide or attack, including during political discussions (*Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship*).
