On the Journey

+Our allegiance to country is important, but never more important than our allegiance to God. Our primary identity is not as citizens of a particular country, but as children of God. It is God to whom we belong, first and foremost. This is the message of today's readings.

The first reading from Isaiah is about Cyrus, king of Persia, to whom the Lord gave power to subdue the Babylonians. Cyrus then allowed the captive Israelites to return to Jerusalem. This rebellion was accomplished, not for the sake of Cyrus or his kingdom, but for God's glory. Of primary importance is not belonging to the Babylonians or Persians, but belonging to God and knowing that there is none other besides Him.

In the Gospel, Jesus' opponents try to entrap Him on the question of taxation. Jesus' response is repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God. Caesar's image and inscription are on the Roman coin. Thus, they belong to


Jesus does not ask, but the next question is implied: Where do we find God's image and inscription? The answer is: in us, his children. God created us in his image and inscribed his law on our hearts. No matter what their allegiance to Rome, Jesus' message to his opponents is that they belong to God. Caesar may claim the coins to be his own, but he cannot claim people; they are claimed by God.

We are God's, we belong to Him. We must repay to God what belongs to God. How do we do this? We do this by giving God our very selves: loving Him with all our heart, all our soul, all our mind. We do this by giving God the best we have to offer: our first fruits of time, talent and treasure. We do this by giving God our primary allegiance: putting God first, before nations or kingdoms, political or economic systems, institutions or ideologies.

Participating in the celebration of the Eucharist – especially when we are able to do so in person, but still in a unique way when we "virtually" gather - we find ourselves united with Christ and one another in offering our very selves to God. The grace of the sacrament strengthens our unity and allegiance to the One to whom we belong, now and forever.

May we give of ourselves in ways, especially in this time of pandemic, that continue to bring us closer to the Lord and to one another, building up the kingdom

+As we approach Election Day on November 3rd, we were able to get additional copies of the Michigan Catholic Conference "focus" on "The Issues, The Candidates, and Your Vote 2020". You will find them at the doors of the church. The brochure is also on the parish website. We are also planning on a "pre-election" prayer service; more information to follow. Often, things have "crashed" and that results in some major "re-boots." (Sounds like I know what I'm talking about, eh?) Well, this was troublesome in getting the parish website back up, and long story short, an older version got placed up with incorrect information about mass times (stating a Sunday 10 a.m. mass, and weekday mass at 8:15 a.m.) Know that there still is NO 10 a.m. mass yet (due to sanitizing after the 8 a.m. mass), and daily mass is at 9 a.m., with one HFRS classroom of a particular grade taking the lead every other week on a Friday physically in the church.) My apologies for any confusion this has caused!

+Many kudos to our Religious Formation staff and volunteers who have been busy getting our "virtual" catechism classes in place! It truly is a dedicated effort to make things come together, especially when we had been hoping that we could have made "live" class sessions happen. By now, parents should have picked up the grade booklets for their child(ren), and can then start on their adventure of growing in faith together. (Maybe we should work on nominating people for some Emmy awards for the coming season!)

+Our very own Holy Family Regional School is celebrating its 40th anniversary this year! We congratulate them and all those who helped make the school's "re-founding" possible, and helped to make it a real treasure for the many families who have/continue to send their children to HFRS for a great, solid Catholic education! This weekend, the school kicks off its Annual Appeal; as you see at mass, and should receive a mailing at home, please be generous as you can in supporting the future of our school!

+To the many who have made their gifts/pledges for our 2020 CSA effort, I offer my prayerful thanks and gratitude for the sacrifices you have made! As I write on Monday, we have received \$380,665 in donations/pledges against our goal of \$302,657, which — should all of it be paid — will generate a refund back to us of just over \$78,000. This will be a help in payment toward our loan balance — but we certainly could use some additional help.

I kindly ask those of you who have yet to commit to our 2020 CSA to please do so, so that we can pull things together and finalize where we stand with our finances for the coming year. May God bless you as you pray over your stewardship in this area!

+The parish has been trying to recruit a replacement for one of our maintenance staff who has returned to school in pursuing a different vocational opportunity. It is full-time, involves janitorial and some maintenance; it is afternoons and some weekend work. Benefits are included for full-time. If it is a situation for just someone working part-time, then benefits are limited. Know anyone? Have them contact Mr. Paul Rybicki, parish business manager.

Saint of the Day Pope John Paul II

May 18, 1920 - April 2, 2005

Feast Day: October 22

Co-Patron of World Youth Day

Born in Wadowice, Poland, Karol Jozef Wojtyla had lost his mother, father, and older brother before his 21st birthday. Karol's promising academic career at Krakow's Jagiellonian University was cut short by the outbreak of World War II. While working in a quarry and a chemical factory, he enrolled in an "underground" seminary in Kraków. Ordained in 1946, he was immediately sent to Rome where he earned a doctorate in theology.

Back in Poland, a short assignment as assistant pastor in a rural parish preceded his very fruitful chaplaincy for university students. Soon Fr.

Wojtyla earned a doctorate in philosophy and began teaching that subject at Poland's University of Lublin.

Communist officials allowed Wojtyla to be appointed auxiliary bishop of Kraków in 1958, considering him a relatively harmless intellectual.

Bishop Wojtyla attended all four sessions of Vatican II and contributed especially to its *Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World*. Appointed as archbishop of Kraków in 1964, he was named a cardinal three years later.

Elected pope in October 1978, he took the name of his short-lived, immediate predecessor. Pope John Paul II was the first non-Italian pope in 455 years. In time, he made pastoral visits to 124 countries.

John Paul II promoted ecumenical and interfaith initiatives, especially the 1986 Day of Prayer for World Peace in Assisi. He visited Rome's main synagogue and the Western Wall in Jerusalem; he also established diplomatic relations between the Holy See and Israel. He improved Catholic-Muslim relations, and in 2001 visited a mosque in Damascus, Syria.

His 1979 visit to Poland encouraged the growth of the Solidarity movement there and the collapse of communism in central and eastern Europe 10 years later. John Paul II began World Youth Day and traveled to several countries for those celebrations.

In his 27 years of papal ministry, John Paul II wrote 14 encyclicals and five books, canonized 482 saints and beatified 1,338 people. In the last years of his life, he suffered from Parkinson's disease and was forced to cut back on some of his activities. Pope John Paul II died on April 2, 2005 at the age of 84.

Pope Benedict XVI beatified John Paul II in 2011, and Pope Francis canonized him in 2014.

Praying the Chaplet of Divine Mercy

You are invited to join with other parishioners after morning Mass to pray the Chaplet of Divine Mercy in the Church. All are welcome to join in on this brief service of prayer. When funeral masses (and their associated set-ups) conflict for use of the church, the chaplet prayer gathering may be moved to an alternate location or cancelled.

Low Gluten Hosts

St. Andrew Parish has low gluten hosts available for those with gluten intolerance or celiac disease. These are still available despite the pandemic, so please, if you have need of these hosts, let a mass coordinator know before mass begins and we will be happy to make arrangements for you to receive a low gluten host.

Adult Confirmation

Adults who are baptized Catholic, have received First Communion but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation, are eligible to sign up for our Adult Confirmation program. Two times a year, Confirmation preparation sessions will be offered to prepare adults for the celebration of Confirmation.

Confirmation may be received at different times throughout the year; first at our St. Andrew Parish celebration, or at the Cathedral of the Most Blessed Sacrament on the Feast of Christ the King Sunday, or on Pentecost Sunday. The Archdiocese of Detroit encourages people to participate in their parish Confirmation celebrations. When this is not possible then people are invited to participate in the Cathedral's Confirmation ceremonies.

Adult Confirmation is a very simple process:

- 1. You need to have been Baptized and received Communion in the Catholic Church. If not, you need to register for the RCIA process.
- 2. You need to attend the Confirmation preparation sessions. Candidates for Confirmation are asked to complete all preparation sessions before the reception of the Sacrament of Confirmation.
- 3. You are asked to bring to the first session a recent copy of your Baptismal Certificate with notations.

 Please contact the church of your baptism and request a "new" Baptismal Certificate with notations (issued within six months).
- 4. You need to choose a Confirmation sponsor. A Confirmation sponsor must be over sixteen years of age; be a practicing Catholic who has received the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist; and not be the father or mother of the one to be confirmed (cf. CCC 874). Canon Law further states: "It is desirable that the one who undertook the role of sponsor at Baptism be the sponsor for Confirmation" (CCC 893).



BLESSED CARLO ACUTIS, WHOSE FEAST DAY IS OCT 12, IS THE FIRST MILLENNIAL TEENAGER TO BE BEATIFIED.





Bl. Carlo was born in 1991 and grew up in Milan, Italy. His parents were not practicing Catholics, but at a very young age Bl. Carlo started asking many questions about God and wanted to go to Mass every day. He loved spending extra time with the Blessed Sacrament and had a deep love for Jesus in the Eucharist. He was a normal teenager who loved playing video games and spending time with friends. His passion lay in creating websites that showcased his special devotion to the Eucharist and Marian apparitions. He started volunteering as a catechist's aide at eleven years old! At the age of fifteen, Carlo was diagnosed with leukemia, but he did not lose his faith. He offered his suffering to the Lord, the Pope, and to the Church. He died in 2006 and was buried in Assisi, the home of Saint Francis.

BI. Carlo Acutis' beatification took place October 10th after a miracle was attributed to his prayers and the Grace of God. A boy named Mattheus, in Brazil, was healed from a serious birth defect after he and his mother asked Carlo Acutis to pray for his healing.

What a beautiful example of speech, conduct, love, faith and purity. To all our youth, remember: "Don't let anyone look down on you because you are young, but set an example for the believers in speech, in conduct, in love, in faith and in purity." *1 Timothy 4:12*. You can do some amazing things to help spread our beautiful Catholic faith. We are all here to help you.
