### On the Journey

+Today is the Solemnity of Our Lord, Jesus Christ, King of the Universe – Christ the King Sunday, signaling the end of the Church's liturgical year 2020. This is a grand and mighty title given to our Lord, as we acknowledge that He is King of all Heaven and Earth. Jesus, however, does not call on us to treat Him like royalty. Instead, He commands that we pay homage to Him by caring for his people.

The Gospel (cycle B for Sundays; year 1 for weekdays, by the way) is clear: Feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, care for the sick, visit the imprisoned, clothe the naked, welcome the stranger. Jesus plainly tells us that by doing for others, we are doing for Jesus himself. Conversely, when we fail to care for another and their needs, we fail to care for Jesus. All who have answered Christ's call of discipleship, and who love and care for others, will inherit the Kingdom He has prepared for us.

There is an abundance of wisdom in the readings the Church has chosen for this special day. Surely it is no accident that on the same day that we honor Jesus as King, He is also referred to as shepherd. One title appears grand and mighty. The other seems humble and unassuming, but both are integrally tied to the meaning of this feast. For in coming to inaugurate and reign over the Kingdom, Christ also came in perfect humility. It is a humility that "demands the same of us, in a holistic attitude that serves as an antidote to secularism." (Cf. Pope Pius XI, *Quas primas* [encyclical], promulgated Dec. 11, 1925, which introduced this feast).

It is a powerful image in today's Gospel as Jesus sits on his *glorious throne* surrounded by his angels, with the nations assembled before Him waiting to be judged. It is clear that those sheep who have listened to his voice will be welcomed fully into the Kingdom, for they will have been living in the Kingdom on earth. The goats, however, will be left aside, having not heeded the simple commands of their Shepherd.

When we are able to gather for Eucharist, it means that we, however well or imperfectly, hear and are hopefully *listening* to our Shepherd's voice. By the way we cooperate with God's grace, we can continue what we are doing: we can begin again: or we can do more to listen and follow his word, and help to bring about the Kingdom in the here and now.

Let us work to honor and praise God by the way in which you and I work to heal divisions and build up the Body of Christ here on earth!

May the Holy Spirit bestow special graces on our students as they complete the Sacraments of Initiation. I hope and pray that this will not be an “end” but a “renewed” beginning for your faith journey!

+As you are aware, reported cases of Covid-19 have risen sharply over the last couple weeks here in Michigan. It signals more danger for all of us, and points to possible new/additional directives in the State as well as the Archdiocese regarding health care precautions. These can change pretty much at a moment’s notice, so please be aware of the constantly changing environment. I fear right now that we may once again be put under a “lock-down” order, so let’s do our part to prevent the spread of Covid.

Thank you in advance for your cooperation in this matter.





## Corporal Works of Mercy

The idea that what we do for others we do for God as well is a daunting thought, because we aren't always kind to others. But the kindness we do show to others is shown to God. That feels good. The Corporal Works of Mercy in today's Gospel talk about helping those in need. We can take them literally, but we can also get creative in our interpretation.

To feed the hungry we can donate to food pantries and organize canned food drives. But we can also provide a meal or offer to grocery shop for someone shut in at home.

To provide drink to the thirsty, we can donate to a water project. We could also keep ourselves hydrated, use less water for showers, and read what Pope Francis has to say about water in his encyclical, "Laudato Si" (Google it) under Section II, "The Issue of Water."

We can donate clothing to clothe the naked. We can also purchase clothing from stores which practice fair trade and fair wages for employees.

To shelter the homeless, we don't necessarily have to take in strangers, but we can provide food or toiletries to shelters. We can also pray for those without a home, and lend our time and tools to a neighbor for home repairs.

We can visit or call a sick friend or neighbor. We could also make a cheerful card or get a group together to stand outside their window and sing.

If you can't physically visit a prison, you can donate bibles to a church's prison ministry. In your own neighborhood, just talking and listening to a homebound person fits this category.

Supporting the family of a deceased person at a wake or funeral is a way to bury the dead. But you can also visit the cemetery where your family members have been laid to rest, take part in a cemetery clean-up, or provide a dish for a funeral luncheon.

However you choose to observe these works of mercy, remember that you are serving God as well.

**Christ the King Sunday**

In our First Reading today, the prophet Ezekiel uses the imagery of a shepherd rescuing his sheep to illustrate how our Lord God reaches out to those in need. In St. Matthew's Gospel, Jesus clearly teaches that His followers must serve others with acts of Christian mercy and love to enter the Kingdom of God. He proclaims: *Whatever you did for one of the least brothers of mine, you did for me.* These Gospel instructions are the foundation of the Catholic Church's Spiritual and Corporal Works of Mercy, on which St. Teresa modeled her life and ministry to the "poorest of the poor" in the streets of Calcutta. Like St. Teresa, we, as Paschal stewards, accept God's call to proclaim Jesus to all we meet on our own journey toward holiness. May her model of love, charity, and mercy encourage us to open our hearts and minds in service of the poor, sick, and strangers in our midst and to return a generous portion of our blessings. In this upcoming Advent season, adopt a family in need, visit a relative or friend in a nursing home or assisted living facility, or sponsor a refugee family.

## CHRIST THE KING VS. TODAY'S SUPERHEROES

It's important to explain to kids the meaning of the title "Christ the King" if for no other reason because it will help them connect the Old Testament and the Gospel, making the "big picture" of God's plan of salvation clearer. Our current superhero craze—in many ways, function as demigods for a secular culture that still yearns for God.

Today's superhero stories also can't help pointing to the true and the good. As Bishop Barron points out in Spider-man, Iron Man, Superman and the God-Man, they even carry some theological heft:

*I can't help but hear an echo of the ancient Christological doctrine in the latest crop of films featuring Batman, Superman and Spider-Man. All three of these superheroes are hybrids—combinations of the extraordinary and the ordinary. In all three cases we have someone who, in his lowliness, is able completely to identify and sympathize with our suffering and, in his transcendence, is able to do something about it.*

Let's put a fun spin on the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, by imagining how Jesus fits into the superhero genre. What if there were a Solemnity of Christ the Superhero?

Let's compare and contrast Jesus and the superheroes:

What's your favorite superheroes? Think of their heroes logo, their alias (e.g., Jesus, Bruce Wayne, etc.). List their super powers. What are Jesus' "super powers"? Some possibilities: Healing; forgiving; calming storms; multiplying loaves and fishes; etc. Where does he get these powers? List the superhero's nemeses (enemies). For Jesus, possibilities might include sin and death; you can debate whether the Pharisees and other religious leaders who put him to death were really enemies or not. What does Jesus say about our attitude toward enemies? How would "loving your enemy" change the story of some of the other superheroes listed? Do any of the superheroes listed practice love of enemy? List the "sidekicks" and close friends. For Jesus, these might include the twelve apostles, the women disciples who helped support him, and/or the saints and all the baptized faithful. What is the superhero's mission or motto. For Jesus' mission, see Luke 4 and John 3, among other possible Scripture references. If you could be a superhero, what would be your name, mission, motto, and superpowers. Point out that we have certain "superpowers" that we acquired through baptism.




