On the Advent Journey

"Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God."

+There is a somewhat humorous, if not also insightful, observation about the often-used command in Scripture: Do not be afraid. This observation is that any time we hear "fear not," or "do not be afraid," something very-worth-being-scared-of is about to happen. In other words, the words "fear not" ought to strike fear into our hearts, because we are about to be asked to do something far outside of our comfort zone: to trust, to have faith, to grow, to love, to follow where the Lord is leading us.

There is something amusing in this, because there is also some truth to it. How many of us have had children say, "don't be mad, but..." (followed by something that likely makes us mad), or heard someone say, "don't worry, but..." (followed by something no one would blame us for worrying about.)

But there is something quite insightful in this observation, too. And that is, we can laugh at the idea of it because we know, in the end, that all will be well. How do we know this? Because of *why* we are told not to be afraid: *Do not fear, I am with you* (Isaiah 41:10); *Be strong, do not fear! He comes to save you* (Isaiah 35:4); *Take courage, it is I, do not be afraid* (Mark 6:50). From the beginning of human time, God has promised us He will not forsake us, or leave us alone. And so today: *Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God.*

Mary, perfected in grace, has been chosen by God for something we'd agree that anyone of common sense would find frightening. But in her knowledge of God's favor upon her (another way of saying God would always be with her), she steps boldly and fully into the unknown. She has been told that *the Holy Spirit will come upon her*; and *that the power of the Most High will overshadow her*. She will not be alone. She will have the help and grace of God for whom nothing will be impossible.

And so her "fiat" – *May it be done to me according to your word* – makes perfect sense. How could she not say yes, when her faith and trust in a God who had nurtured his covenant and fulfilled every promise, was affirmed by his envelopment of her in his love and protection? How could we not say yes, when the same God who found favor with Mary, finds favor with us and never forsakes us? He can strengthen us, Paul writes to the Romans. Where we cannot, God can. We do nothing alone, and all things through the grace of God.

The angels and the prophets, and Jesus himself, are right to tell us "fear not." For God is with us – *Emmanuel*. And so we can laugh at the observation regarding Scripture, and we can laugh in the face of our fear. And in these remaining days of Advent, we give thanks for our Triune God who desires to be in relationship with us, who dwelt among us and whose Holy Spirit empowers us in our faith.

The "O Antiphons" of Advent

The Roman Church has been singing the "O" Antiphons since at least the eighth century. They are the antiphons that accompany the *Magnificat* canticle of Evening Prayer from December 17-23. They are a magnificent theology that uses ancient biblical imagery drawn from the messianic hopes of the Old Testament to proclaim the coming Christ as the fulfillment not only of Old Testament hopes, but present ones as well. Their repeated use of the imperative "Come!" embodies the longing of all for the Divine Messiah.

December 21

O Radiant Dawn,
splendor of eternal light, sun of justice:
come and shine on those who dwell in darkness and in the shadow of death.

December 22

O King of all nations and keystone of the Church:
come and save man, whom you formed from the dust!

December 23

O Emmanuel, our King and Giver of Law:
come to save us, Lord our God!

Christmas Star 2020

Anyone who knows the Christmas Story, is familiar with the star that appeared in the sky during the birth of Jesus, seen by the shepherds and leading the Magi to the Christ Child. Stars and astrological signs can be found in various books of the bible with significance to both those of biblical time, but also to Christians who are awaiting the second coming of Christ.

This December there is an astronomical phenomenon that has many believers and non-believers alike preparing to turn their attention to the night sky. On December 21 the planets Saturn and Jupiter will align and form a "Christmas star" shape in their alignment. Christian astronomers note that the last occurrence of something like this at this time of the year was back in the 1200s.

The "Christmas star" can be seen anywhere on Earth if the sky is clear, with the best view on December 21. Why be excited about this? Besides the fact that stars are pretty, there are a couple of reasons that we as Catholic Christians should be excited.

The Christmas star of 2020 is a true reminder of what the star may have looked like so many years ago when Jesus was born as theologians have speculated that it was an alignment of the planets Jupiter, Venus and Saturn that formed the first star.

The star can help us point others to Jesus. In the same way the star is scripture led the Magi to the Christ Child, we can use the star to talk to others about the birth of Jesus. When family and friends who may not know Jesus or have turned away from the faith talk about the bright star in the sky, we can use the opportunity to share the story of Jesus in a very natural way.

May this phenomenon this year help all of us take time to look at the sky and follow the "star" to Jesus.

Anointing of the Sick

When is it appropriate to receive the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick? We are permitted to receive the Sacrament, prior to surgery, for those who are ill, those who are in the hospital, for those of Advanced Age, for those residing in a nursing home and for those who could be near death. The minister of the sacrament is the priest. The oil used, called the *Oil of the Infirm*, is an oil which is blessed by our Archbishop. This sacrament is found in Sacred Scripture, the apostle James taught us, "Are there any who are sick among you? Let them send for the priests of the Church, and let the priests pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord; and the prayer of faith will save the sick persons, and the Lord will raise them up; and if they have committed any sins, their wills will be forgiven them." [James 5:14f]

Our Lord's Love is beyond our understanding. Our Lord Jesus' great love for us isn't practical. He loves us so much, that He sent His only Son to be our Savior and Redeemer. With that, if you believe you need anointing or a family member/close friend needs Anointing, please call our Parish Office.

Please don't wait until death seems imminent. It is best to contact our Parish Office sooner, rather than later to receive the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. For many years, our ancestors in faith would wait to have the Sacrament administered only to those who were believed to be near death, which is known as *Extreme Unction* (Final Anointing). Certainly if a Priest is able, we will always make every effort to be with someone in those final moments, but remember this sacrament is a **gift** not only reserved to those who are close to death. It can be used for a multitude of reasons. I personally can say, although a person may not receive "bodily healing" they can receive "eternal healing."
