On the Christmas Journey

+When a baby is born, it is an occasion of great joy and celebration. Family and friends visit the new parents, excited phone calls are made, and social media announcements invite all to share in the family's excitement. Everyone gets caught up in the jubilation. Then after a short while, the "hubbub" gives way to the routine of daily life.

Christmas is the meeting of heaven and earth, the moment when the eternal God enters our broken world as both fully God and fully human – the fulfillment of the hopes and prophecies of millennia. This truth is so monumental that it should define every single day of our lives. The excitement of the birth of this Child should never wane. That is the challenge: to allow the wondrous, wonderful mystery of the Incarnation to truly permeate our hearts and minds – and not just now on Christmas, but every day of our lives.

As we celebrate the feast of the Holy Family this weekend too, we sometimes imagine them as so very different from ourselves: holier and more spiritual. Certainly, that is true. But it is important for us to also realize how *fully human* they were — which means that what they attained *is possible* for each one of us! Often we try to make them more like us so we can "relate" to them, when really we are called to imitate them in their holiness. We gather in faith to celebrate with them, and pray that their holiness in living "family life" sets a beautiful model for all of us.

They were committed to God and to one another, despite terrible hardships and circumstances. In Saints Joseph and Mary, we not only have human saints who give us an example of how to live together in mutual love and concern while facing day-to-day demands and challenges, but we also have intercessors in prayer who can help us through difficult times. And, of course, in Jesus Christ – both fully human and fully divine – we have the example of perfect love who provides the Way to eternal life, and the Holy Spirit who remains in his place to assist us in all we do.

So with the conclusion of Advent 2020 and the beginning of this joyful season of Christmas – albeit a quieter one, given the pandemic – let us praise and thank God for the gift of Emmanuel in our lives. May we pray that we come to recognize his presence in our world and help to make Him known by our words and actions!

May the blessings of the Lord continue to be showered upon all of us and upon our families and friends – and in a special way, upon all those who are struggling with pain, loss, loneliness, unemployment and all the horrible impacts of the coronavirus that has devastated our world this year. May we be beacons of light to help them in their times of darkness and need.

I'll ask Him to light your spirit, As I tell Him of your love, So then pray one for another, As I lift your eyes above.





The Holy Family

On this first Sunday after Christmas, the Liturgy invites us to celebrate the Feast of the Holy Family of Nazareth.

The Holy Family Prayer

JESUS, Son of God and Son of Mary, bless our family. Graciously inspire in us the unity, peace, and mutual love that you found in your own family in the little town of Nazareth.

MARY, Mother of Jesus and Our Mother, nourish our family with your faith and your love. Keep us close to your Son, Jesus, in all our sorrows and joys.

JOSEPH, Foster-father to Jesus, guardian and spouse of Mary, keep our family safe from harm. Help us in all times of discouragement or anxiety.

HOLY FAMILY OF NAZARETH, make our family one with you. Help us to be instruments of peace. Grant that love, strengthened by grace, may prove mightier than all the weaknesses and trials through which our families sometimes pass. May we always have God at the center of our hearts and homes until we are all one family, happy and at peace in our true home with you. Amen.

The Holy Family is the name given to the family unit of Jesus. We know very little about the life of the Holy Family. The Gospels speak of the early years of the Holy Family, including the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem, the flight into Egypt, and the finding of Jesus in the temple. While the exact details of the day-to-day life of the Holy Family may be unknown, we can still learn a lot from the stories we do have.

Devotion to the Holy Family is a recent development, growing in popularity in the 17th century. On October 26, 1921 the Congregation of Rites (under Pope Benedict XV) inserted the Feast of the Holy Family into the Latin Rite general calendar. Until then it had been celebrated regionally. Popes before and including Benedict XV (especially Leo XIII) promoted the feast as a way to counter the breakdown of the family unit. Today the Church celebrates the Feast on the Sunday between Christmas and the Feast of Mary Mother of God. If both Christmas and New Year's Day fall on Sundays, no Sunday exists between the two dates, so the Church celebrates the Holy Family Feast on December 30th. If the feast falls on the 30th, attendance is not obligatory. Up until 1969, the Holy Family feast was kept on the first Sunday after Epiphany. It was transferred to its current date in 1969.

It seems appropriate that we celebrate the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph during the Christmas season, typically just after families have gathered for Christmas, although this year and this Christmas have been anything but typical. The feast is not just about the Holy Family, but about our families too. The Holy family is a model for all families and for domestic life in general. Today's readings ask us to put family and life in perspective. When we take care of aging parents we care for Christ, who is with all and in all. When we approach one another with compassion, kindness, gentleness, and patience, we communicate Christ's love. Even when the Lord leads in ways we cannot quite understand, we must follow God's will, knowing that in doing so, we cooperate with God's grace in our midst. Every family is called to be a holy family.

When asked to describe your family, no matter how wonderful it may be, your first description is probably not "holy." And yet, this is our primary call. Each of us as people of God, and each of our families, is called to be holy. We are called to live as God's people in the world, to communicate God's love and presence through the way that we live together and in relationship with others. Even Mary, Joseph, and Jesus faced challenges and trials. And yet they rose to the occasion, listened to and followed God's will, trusting in God's abiding presence even when they knew that doing so involved risk and uncertainty. Being Christian people in today's world is not always easy, even when we know it is right. This is the meaning of holiness. This is what it means to be a holy family. Today's feast is a good time to remember the family unit and pray for our human and spiritual families. We also may take this feast to evaluate our own family life. What ways may it be improved?



Catholic Daily Reflections

Making a Christ-Candle

SUPPLIES

parafin or used white candles
No. 3 empty can (32 ounces, holds 4 cups)
pencial
10" piece of string or wick
can opener
holly or evergreens
other decorations of choice

The Christ-Candle is a nice decoration for the family table at Christmas. Here are the directions to make and decorate one's own candle.

DIRECTIONS

An attractive Christ-Candle for the family table may be made at home by melting paraffin or used white candles. Take a No. 3 size empty can, the kind in which juice comes. Remove one end of the can. Across the top open place a pencil to which is tied a ten inch piece of string for the wick. Pour the melted wax or paraffin into the can until full. Allow to cool. Then place in the refrigerator for an hour. When the bottom of the can is removed by a can opener, the candle will slip out easily. It may be entwined with holly or other evergreens to signify the Light from the Root of Jesse and lighted at meal times.

A child may cut from old Christmas cards a Madonna and Child, a star or angel, and attach these with rubber cement to the candle. Our eight-year-old daughter decorated a delightful candle by pinning to it tiny bright metal stars, spangles and snowflakes by means of straight pins. These decorations come packaged at Christmas goods section of five and ten cent stores, or are available from mail order houses.


