
The feast of the Epiphany is a major event in Jesus' life story, and in our own salvation history. The magi, men from the east – that is, not from the Israelite people – followed the star to find...the newborn king of the Jews. What a startling thing. They knew something profound had happened in the world, even if it had not been part of their heritage to expect such a thing. Yet they were overjoyed at seeing the star, and upon finding Jesus, they prostrated themselves and did him homage. To this baby they offer gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh, and we see the connection to what is foretold in today's first reading. Rise up in splendor! Your light has come, the glory of the Lord shines upon you...all from Sheba shall come bearing gold and frankincense, and proclaiming the praises of the Lord.

The feast of the Epiphany reminds us that the glory of the Lord indeed shines upon us in our present day. Jesus has come into the world. We should all do Him praise by the way we live our lives!

# Epiphany Home Blessing on January 3, 2021

From the east come the Magi to Bethlehem to adore the Lord; and opening their treasures they offered precious gifts: gold for the great King, incense for the true God, and myrrh as a symbol of His burial. The blessing of the home, and the inscription of the initials of the three Magi at each entrance door, is an old Epiphany custom that is still practiced by some today. Using specially blessed chalk, many families mark above the entrance door of their homes with the year and with the inscription CMB, the initials of the traditional names of the

Magi: Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar (example: 20+C+M+B+21). The inscription really stands for Christus Mansionem Benedicat, Latin for "Christ, bless this house."

Use the chalk to write above the entrance to your home:

20 + C + M + B + 21

As you are writing pray the following:

O Lord, God Almighty, we ask Your blessing on this home and all who dwell within. Grant that if it be Your will, we may enjoy physical and mental health and Your spiritual protection. May all who visit our home this year rejoice to find You dwelling among us. May we seek to serve You forever and ever, through Christ our Lord. Amen

# Week of Prayer for Christian Unity January 18 - January 25, 2021

The theme for the 2021 Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is "Abide in My Love...You Shall Bear Much Fruit." It was discerned by the Monastic Community of Grandchamp in Switzerland and finds its origins in the Gospel of John (cf. John 15:5-9).

In choosing the 2021 theme, the Community of Grandchamp desired to share the experience and wisdom of their contemplative life abiding in the love of God and keeping his commandment of "loving one another as He has loved us." They remind Christians worldwide about the importance of praying for the fruits of closer communion with our brothers and sisters in Christ and greater solidarity with the whole of creation.

"In these days of the Coronavirus threat, our world has become smaller," said Fr. James Loughran, SA. "We are one in our response. More than ever, we need to appreciate the value of Christian unity."

The traditional period in the northern hemisphere for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is January 18-25. Those dates were proposed by Servant of God, Fr. Paul Wattson, SA, founder of the Society of the Atonement, who initiated observance of the first "Church Unity Octave" in 1908, to cover the original days of the feasts of the Chair of St. Peter (Jan. 18) and the Conversion of St. Paul (Jan. 25), and therefore have a symbolic significance.

Each year, Graymoor Ecumenical & Interreligious Institute adapts the texts chosen and prepared by representatives of the Vatican and the World Council of Churches and publishes materials and resources for use in celebrating the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity in the U.S.

# **Epiphany**

Today, in St. Matthew's Gospel, the evangelist retells the story of the Magi visiting the Christ-child, the newborn King. In this initial meeting, they are overwhelmed, and in response, venerate our Lord by prostrating themselves, face down. The Magi open their treasures and offer Jesus gold, frankincense, and myrrh. These gifts foreshadow Christ's royalty, divinity, and suffering. The Scripture passages from Isaiah and St. Paul further convey that the Good News of salvation is to be proclaimed to all people. Do we, as faithful stewards strive to follow the Magi's example of offering adoration, praise, and glory to God? Do we, in thanksgiving, embrace the Good News, deepening our personal relationship in Christ? Then, in turn, spread His joy, peace, and message of hope and salvation to all those we meet? To encounter Christ, plan to attend Alpha or a similar evangelization event offered at your parish.



# **Epiphany**

"The Twelve Days of Christmas" is a beloved carol. It sings of the Christmas season, which begins the day after Christmas and ends on Jan. 6, the Feast of the Epiphany.

One definition of "epiphany" is to make known or reveal. Many revelations took place at the time of Jesus' birth. Angels revealed the Good News to the shepherds. And a bright star revealed the way for the Magi. Their journey was long and difficult, but filled with faith as they search for the divine child. Their gift of gold symbolized kings, frankincense was used in worship, and myrrh pointed to the humanness of Jesus. (It is thought that Joseph used the gifts to fund the Holy Family's trip to Egypt.)

The shepherds and Magi left the stable sharing the good news and glorifying God. Our theme in Faith Formation this year, "Jesus, Light in the Darkness," reminds us that we are to take the light of Jesus out into the world, too. In this new year, we have reason to hope. Hope for health, hope for meeting in person, hope to return to school and activities. Continue to follow your faith throughout this new year, as the Wise Men did. Be open to what God may reveal to you. May your new year be full of Epiphanies.

# An Activity to do with your family on the 12th day of Christmas

# **Prayer Star**

Supplies needed:

2 sheets of construction paper (yellow and any other color)

5-point star pattern

scissors

pen or markers

small brass fastener.



# Direction:

Trace the star pattern on a sheet of 8-1/2 x 11 yellow construction paper. In the center of the star, write the words "Jesus, Our Light, Has Come!" In each of the five points, write "Family and Friends," "Church," "Community," "Country," "World." Make a small hole in the center of the star and fasten it to another sheet of construction paper. Along the top of the background sheet, write "We Remember to Pray For"

Using the star for your daily prayer and devotion, turn the star so that one of the points is directed to the top of the page and use what is written in the point as the focus. Turn the star each day so that all five points have been used throughout the week. At the end of your prayer and devotion time, invite a member of your household to read Psalm 72:18.19. At the end of the reading, invite everyone to respond: ARISE, SHINE! OUR LIGHT HAS COME!






