Parish Mission Statement

On the Journey

+Samuel is the first in a long line of prophets in biblical Israel. He lived in the 11th century BC, at a time when the Ark of the Covenant was kept in a tabernacle at Shiloh. Dedicated to the Lord's service by his parents, the boy Samuel had been living at the shrine since he was a toddler.

In today's reading, Samuel hears a voice calling to him in the night and thinks it is Eli, but it turns out that God is calling him. Eli tells Samuel to answer the Lord, so that God may give him whatever message He intends.

Samuel does as Eli instructs, and the Scriptures go on to say that, Samuel grew up, and the Lord was with him, not permitting any word of his to be without effect. As a prophet, his role was not so much to predict the future, but to speak God's word to the people and to offer advice to Israel's first two kings.

Saint Paul also spoke God's word to his people. Today we heard part of this message to the Corinthians, reminding them that *The body...is not for immorality, but for the Lord*. The Church in Corinth was dealing with several cases of public immorality, and they wrote to Paul seeking advice. He reminds them — and us — that the body *is a temple of the Holy Spirit*. It is these very bodies that God will transform and raise on the Last Day. So we should treat them with the dignity they deserve.

In our Gospel from John, two followers of John the Baptist, including Andrew, hear John refer to Jesus as the *Lamb of God*. And so they leave John and follow Jesus. As Samuel was led to God's voice by Eli's directions, so, too, are Andrew and the other disciple led to Jesus by John's words.


When He sees them, Jesus asks them, What are you looking for? Their response is simply to ask where He is staying and He invites them to come, and you will see. The evangelist tells us that they stayed with Him that day. We don't know what transpired during their time together, but it was enough to lead Andrew to go and tell his brother Simon, We have found the Messiah. He, too, goes to Jesus. When Jesus meets Simon, He gives him the name Cephas, which is translated Peter.

As God called Samuel and as Jesus called his disciples, so have we been called. We are temples of the Holy Spirit, made for the Lord. At Mass when we receive Holy Communion, we take the Lord himself into our bodies, so that we might become more like Him, and that we might ourselves be prophets of the Good News of Jesus Christ.

So as we start our journey through the coming new year, let us be attentive to listening for God's voice, speaking to us in whispers, or shouting to us in varied situations. Then, let's put into action what the Lord is asking of us to do.

+We have much to pray for in the coming week (we always have so much to pray for every week!). Special remembrances include the national holiday for Martin Luther King Jr. Day on Monday, January 18. We need to pray for an end to racial injustices



Second Sunday in Ordinary Time



Today's Scripture passages from the First Book of Samuel and St. John's Gospel express the common topic of accepting God's will by responding to His call. Our vocation is the Lord's plan for our lives. St. Paul, in his First Letter to the Corinthian community, professes we are all members of the Body of Christ and temples of the Holy

Spirit, that you are not your own. For you have been purchased at a price. Further in First Corinthians, Paul indicates that through the power of the Holy Spirit, we may be given special spiritual gifts — unique gifts which we use to serve the Lord and carry out His divine plan. These gifts in turn, can lead to prayer, meditation, and contemplation — to conversion of mind to heart, and help the discerning steward discover his or her vocational call from the Lord. This call may be to the priesthood or religious life, marriage, the permanent diaconate, or single life. Are we, like Eli, Samuel, or the Apostles, Peter, John, and Andrew, open to the Lord's prompting in our lives? Week of Prayer for Christian Unity January 18 - January 25, 2021

The theme for the 2021 Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is "Abide in My Love...You Shall Bear Much Fruit." It was discerned by the Monastic Community of Grandchamp in Switzerland and finds its origins in the Gospel of John (cf. John 15:5-9).

In choosing the 2021 theme, the Community of Grandchamp desired to share the experience and wisdom of their contemplative life abiding in the love of God and keeping his commandment of "loving one another as He has loved us." They remind Christians worldwide about the importance of praying for the fruits of closer communion with our brothers and sisters in Christ and greater solidarity with the whole of creation.

St. Andrew has recorded the daily scriptures, the meditation and the prayer for each day of the week of prayer. The video links will be available on the St. Andrew website & the Facebook page. We hope that you will join in praying for unity, not just among our Christian brothers and sisters, but in what has been a very troubled summer, fall, and even now, with racial and political tension, pray that we would all recognize that we are all created by God and ask that we be united to His will.

Gracious Lord, we pray for all the members of your holy Church, that all may abide in you and you in them, that they may be one in your love and bear much fruit.

We also pray for the world. That all may come to believe in your love for them by the fruit of our witness.

Remembering Martin Luther King Jr.

A champion of civil rights, Martin Luther King, Jr.'s dreams were much aligned with many of our Catholic teachings: care for the poor and vulnerable; solidarity in our one human family, regardless of race, ethnicity, religious, or economic differences; the life and dignity of all people; fair wages and treatment in civic matters; peace, equality, and social justice among all; and discipleship of Christ.

It seems fitting that a day honoring Martin Luther King Jr. is also during a week that we pray for Christian Unity and we pray for the protection of the unborn and the dignity of life in general. As we focus our prayers this week, below is a prayer of Martin Luther King Jr. that seems to encompass both unity and respect for life.



O God, we thank you for the fact that you have inspired men and women in all nations and in all cultures. We call you different names: some call you Allah; some call you Elohim; some call you Jehovah; some call you Brahma; some call you the Unmoved Mover. But we know that these are all names for one and the same God. Grant that we will follow you and become so committed to your way and your kingdom that we will be able to establish in our lives and in this world a brother and sisterhood, that we will be able to establish here a kingdom of understanding, where men and women will live together as brothers and sisters and respect the dignity and worth of every human being. In the name and spirit of Jesus. Amen.

National Day of Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children

On January 22, 1973, the Supreme Court legalized abortion throughout the United States in its companion decisions Roe v. Wade and Doe v. Bolton. Since that time, millions of children have lost their lives, and millions of women and families have been wounded by abortion. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM), no. 373, designates January 22 as a particular day of prayer and penance, called the "Day of Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children." The Church directs: In all the Dioceses of the United States of America, January 22 (or January 23, when January 22 falls on a Sunday) shall be observed as a particular day of prayer for the full restoration of the legal guarantee of the right to life and of penance for violations to the dignity of the human person committed through acts of abortion. As individuals, we are called to observe this day through the penitential practices of prayer, fasting and/or almsgiving. In addition, the USCCB also sponsors an annual, nationwide novena called 9 Days for Life, which encompasses the liturgical observance of the Day of Prayer.



9 Days for Life is a novena for the protection of human life. Each day's intention is accompanied by a short reflection and suggested actions to help build a culture of life. Join Catholics nationwide in praying for the respect of human life. The annual 9 Days for Life novena will take place from January 21st through the 29th. Nationwide Prayer Vigil for Life

Each January, the National Prayer Vigil for Life is hosted by the USCCB Pro-Life Secretariat, the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, and The Catholic University of America's Office of Campus Ministry to pray for an end to abortion and a greater respect for all human life.

While thousands of pilgrims typically attend the vigil in person each year, due to the coronavirus pandemic the Basilica will not be open to the public this year. In response, for the first time ever, in addition to the televised Mass, bishops across the country will be taking turns leading live-streamed holy hours throughout the all-night vigil.

The vigil will begin at 8:00 PM on Thursday, January 28 from the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, D.C. with a rosary, followed by Mass opening the National Prayer Vigil for Life. After the Mass throughout the night, holy hours led by bishops will be broadcast on the USCCB's website. The vigil concludes at 8:00 AM on Friday, January 29 with Mass.

The live television broadcasts on January 28 from 8:00-11:00 PM and on January 29 from 8:00-9:00 AM will be provided by EWTN and will also be available via live-stream on the Basilica's website. Live-streaming information for the overnight bishop-led holy hours will be provided on the USCCB's website.



ANYTHING BUT ORDINARY

We are in the second week of a new liturgical season, Ordinary Time. In the current climate of a health crisis and vaccination issues, the past year has been extra unordinary. But the term "ordinary" comes not from the idea that things are normal and run-of-the-mill, but from the numbering of the Sundays with ordinal numbers, 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and so on.

The liturgical color for Ordinary Time is green, which reminds us of hope, which is good because we are in need of hope right now! We have two phases of ordinary time. The winter one is between Christmas and Lent. The second one is after the Easter season and lasts until Advent. There are a few exceptions here and there, but this gives you the main idea.

As we move away from the Christmas season into ordinary time we hear the Gospel stories about the ministry of Jesus. As Jesus calls disciples to follow him, they begin to realize that he is anything but ordinary. In this liturgical season the gospels are filled with healing, forgiveness, love and miracles.

As we walk with Jesus through this time, let us ponder what these stories teach us about living out the ordinary and extraordinary events of our lives. There are blessings in our routines, and also in our struggles. Embrace the calm moments of your life and face the tough ones with grace and strength. You are anything but ordinary!



Mrs. Marn's first grade class conducted a science experiment testing how much light can been seen through different materials.




