Parish Mission Statement

On the Journey

+ Too often, we define a prophet as one who sees into the future – a forecaster, or a psychic. But the biblical meaning of this role is someone who interprets the divine will. The prophet delivers God's message to his/her contemporaries and advocates for adherence to God's plan.

In the first reading, we encounter Moses, God's prophet who did marvelous deeds in fulfillment of God's will – leading the Israelites out of Egypt, giving them God's commandments, and leading them to the brink of the Promised Land. Moses relays God's message of another, far greater prophet: I will raise up for them a prophet like you from among their kin, and will put my words into his mouth; he shall tell them all that I command him. Further, God would hold accountable those who will not listen to his words.

And God did, indeed, send the greatest prophet of all – his Only Begotten Son. In Hebrew, the word for this anointed one is "Messiah." In Greek, it translates as the "Christ." The angels confirmed the arrival of this Messiah in their message to the shepherds on the night of Jesus' birth. The Father confirmed the anointing of Jesus at this baptism in the Jordan and again at his Transfiguration. When Jesus preached, He revealed what the Father wanted Him to reveal. Whenever Jesus spoke or performed healings, He did so in harmony with God's will: "His works and words will manifest Him as the 'Holy One of God.' (CCC 438).

In our Gospel, we read of one such instance. When Jesus was teaching in the synagogue at Capernaum, the people were astonished at his teaching, for He taught them as one having authority and not as the scribes. And that authority was further manifested when He drove out the unclean spirit from a man. The people were even more astounded that even the unclean spirits had obeyed Him. The Church continues to act publicly and authoritatively in the name of Christ. She exists to proclaim the Good News. In the name of Jesus, she calls down God's protection against evil in the rite of initiation.


What is the lesson for us in all of this? Perhaps the clue can be found in today's psalm response: If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts (Psalm 95:7-8). We are constantly being bombarded with messages, with voices: from marketers and politicians; from friends and foes; from those who spew hate and from those who seek peace; from voices who want us to satisfy our own interests and from those who see the common good.

Let us listen to God's prophets. Let us focus on those who have God's words in their mouths. This will take prayer and discernment, but it is possible with God's grace. In the midst of all the noise, may we always be attentive to the voice of God!

- +We continue to pray for our younger students who celebrated the sacrament of Reconciliation this weekend, and those who will be coming to receive the sacrament next weekend. May the grace of the sacrament fill them with trust, hope, gentleness and love!
- +This coming week is the celebration of Catholic Schools Week across the country! We are certainly gifted with the presence of Holy Family Regional School on our campus (and as part of our Family of Parishes). HFRS is celebrating 40 years this year what a profound statement of commitment to Catholic education by the many families who have been a part of this wonderful school over the past four decades! May the Holy Spirit continue to guide and guard Holy Family, and may we all support its endeavors in the years to come! Congratulations to the entire staff of Holy Family who make it the excellent resource that it is in our parish and our community!
- +As we prepare for Lent, we will have 3 gatherings for the celebration of Ash Wednesday. Masses will be at 9 a.m. and 7 p.m.; there will be a Scripture Service at 4:30p.m. All these liturgies will have distribution of ashes (pandemically-distributed with Q-tip applicators!). During the season, we will also offer Stations of the Cross; Eucharistic adoration; and some additional times for reconciliation in addition to Saturday afternoons. There will be a "communal" penance service (similar to what we did during Advent); this time it will be hosted by/at St. Irenaeus Church on Old Perch Road. (Remember that they are one of the three parishes who make up our "Family of Parishes," along with St. Mary and St. Andrew.) More info will be summarized and published in next week's bulletin.
- +I hope that you are taking advantage of one or more of the many opportunities for adult faith formation that are listed in the bulletin! I would guess that many like myself would prefer "live" bible studies, etc., but given the state of things, we don't want you to be disconnected on your faith journey. Thanks to everyone helping us to keep these opportunities going through this time of pandemic!
- +Parish contribution letters were mailed out this past week for families/persons who gave \$250 or more during 2020. You can use these as supporting documentation for preparing your tax forms. If you have not yet received this letter, and believe you should have, wait just a few more days. As we prepare to enter our Lenten journey in a couple short weeks, may we not let this time go by fruitlessly. Let us pray for one another and help each other stay safe and healthy. Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

In today's Scripture passage from Deuteronomy, Moses prophesies about a future figure that God will raise up from the Israelite community, from their own kin. Moses professes: to him you shall listen. In the Gospel from St. Mark, Moses' ancient prophecy is fulfilled in Christ. It is Jesus, who speaks, heals, and drives out evil spirits with authority in the Capernaum synagogue. St. Paul encourages the Corinthians, in his First Letter, to commit themselves entirely to the Lord. As faith-filled stewards, we not only recognize Christ as the Great Prophet, but also support the bishops



and others who *observe and proclaim* Jesus' teaching — His Truth — and prophesy against moral relativism and injustices of our day. It is imperative to contact our governmental officials by telephone, email, or letter about laws or proposed laws that oppose Church teaching.

Beginning the weekend of January 30-31, we will collect your old palms to be burned. Baskets will be available by the doors to place your palms in. We will continue to collect them until February 14. Lent begins on February 17, Ash Wednesday

Feast of the Presentation of the Lord

This feast commemorates how Jesus, as a baby, was presented Temple to God in the Jerusalem. The Feast of the Presentation of the Lord is a combined feast, commemorating the Jewish practice of the purification of the mother after childbirth and the presentation of the child to God in the Temple and his buying back (redemption) from God. It is also known as the Feast of the Purification of Mary, and the Feast of Candlemas. It is also called the Feast of Encounter (Hypapánte in Greek) because the New Testament, represented by the baby Jesus, encountered the Old Testament, represented by Simeon and Anna. Joseph offered two pigeons in the Temple as sacrifice for the purification of Mary after her childbirth and for the presentation and redemption ceremonies performed for baby Jesus.

Feast of St. Blaise

Please Print:

St. Blaise, bishop and martyr, lived in the fourth century in Turkey and Armenia. For a time Blaise lived in the back country in a cave to escape persecution. He lived as a hermit, making friends with the animals and spending his days in solitude and prayer.

One day, a group of hunters discovered St. Blaise and seized him. As he was being taken to the governor, St. Blaise encountered a woman whose pig was being seized by a wolf; St. Blaise commanded the wolf to release the pig, and it was freed unhurt. While in prison, he miraculously cured a small boy who was choking to death on a fishbone lodged in his throat. Also, the woman whose pig had been saved brought St. Blaise candles so that his cell would have light and he could read the sacred Scriptures.

St. Blaise was executed in 316. From the two legends above came the popular custom of blessing throats on the Feast of St. Blasé. Two candles are crossed against the throat, and the following prayer is said:

Through the intercession of Saint Blaise, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from every disease of the throat and from every other illness. In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.


MCC Issues Guiding "Blueprint" Document for 2021-2022 Advocacy


<u>CYO ALUMNI NEWS</u>


