

Weekday

On the Journey

+ God created us because He wants to be in relationship with us. He does not *have* to love us. God *wants* to. The reason we exist is *relationship*. We were made for love. This is a kind of Good News that is not possible without the Divine, for no other love for us is so pure, so unconditional, so freely given.

But in spite of the perfection of this design, we are also broken by sin. Even though we are made for relationship, so many things separate us and limit the love for which we were created.

Our first reading reminds us that physical circumstances such as illness can separate us from one another. There are many other physical forms of separation, such as a job that takes a loved one far away, an emotional wound that demands physical distance as a response, and, of course, death itself.

But spiritual separation also wounds us. Just as leprosy could be passed from one person to another, so also sin infects and hurts those around us. We can see how gossip or lack of integrity influences others. Selfishness or greed hurts those who are most vulnerable. The damage of sin is infectious, just as physical illness can be contagious.

This is the brokenness into which Jesus enters with his mercy. *If you wish, you can make me clean*. The leper's faith can lead us also to this confidence today. Jesus, the eternal Word of God, *moved with pity*, draws near to us! He reaches out to us, in a particular way though his sacramental presence in our celebration of Mass – because He *wants* to heal every separation, whether it be physical, emotional, or spiritual. He does *will* to make us clean.

What wounds can we bring to Him this day? What broken relationship, separation, or sin needs his healing presence? This is why Christ invites us to draw closer to himself, this is why He draws near and reaches out to us. *I do will it*, He tells us, *be made clean!*

+Inside today's bulletin, and elsewhere in our parish communications, you will find the directive by the Archbishop removing the general dispensation for attending Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation, effective March 13, 2021. HOWEVER, there are many specific instances where the dispensation will continue in many various circumstances. I don't want to repeat them all here, so be sure to find the page summarizing the circumstances, and clip it out of the bulletin for "ready reference." This Information was just released this past Tuesday to the general public, so the parish staff is working to make sure that we can help in implementing this directive in concert with the health and safety of our parish family with regard to mass attendance.

+We will start printing in the bulletin and placing on the website a whole series of activities – in addition to all the other "faithformation-type" activities previously listed – to assist you with your Lenten journeys. We will have a couple masses on Ash Wednesday, and a Scripture Service in the afternoon with distribution of ashes. There will be opportunities for Stations of the Cross on Wednesdays after morning mass and Friday evenings. Eucharistic adoration will follow morning mass on Fridays for a short time, and there will be more times scheduled for reconciliation (With regard to confessions, please be mindful that the priest might be hearing confessions in the 'cry room' in the back of church and not – or in addition to – the regular confessional). Why not just clip out the info and tape it to the refrigerator for easy reference?

+It was brought to my attention that we seem to be losing some of our "connectivity" given the pandemic in which we all are experiencing. Some ideas were shared, so starting this weekend – though some have already been doing so – at both the beginning of mass and at the Sign of Peace, we are asking that you acknowledge/greet those around you in church, turning to others, smiling with your eyes, offering a short wave of your hand – just something to make us all aware that we are still a community of faith, on this journey together. Do what's "covid-ly safe" and appropriate, but let's take that moment or two to recognize the Christ in each one of us!

+Wedding anniversaries will be celebrated at the end of February, but without a reception afterwards. Please join us still as we honor those who are reaching "benchmark" anniversaries this coming year; we will offer God thanks and praise for all the blessings and graces He has bestowed upon these couples, and be thankful to them for the example they are to the rest of the community.

+We are moving forward – slowly and deliberately – with our family of parishes' efforts. In talking with both St. Mary of the Hills and St. Irenaeus pastors, we seem to be in agreement with how to attend to the matters of "linking up" more on various projects, activities, and offerings. As I have said before, I do not see this as being any sort of "upheaval" in our parishes, but rather a broadening of opportunities to grow in faith and community with our neighbors!

+Happy Valentine's Day this weekend to all who celebrate! May this year's truly unique celebration bring to mind the importance of not "things," but the real significance of the relationships that we have been blessed with in our lives.

+Know of my constant prayers for all of you! Please keep me in your prayers; this Tuesday, as I go for another infusion treatment, which certainly seem to be working! (I just hope that the staff will leave me a 'paczki' to enjoy when I return from the treatment...!) May the good Lord continue to bless us all and send his Holy Spirit for guidance on our journeys! Looking forward to seeing you!

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Worship

Ash Wednesday – You've been asking Is Ash Wednesday a Holy Day of Obligation?

No, you are not required to attend Mass on Ash Wednesday. You are required on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday to fast and abstain from meat. See rules for fast and abstinence elsewhere in the bulletin.

How will Ashes be distributed?

The Congregation for Divine Worship has provided guidance for distribution during a pandemic. The Archdiocese of Detroit has provided further guidance instructing not to distribute with the thumb because of increased risk of contagion. They have given permission to use a Q-tip or cotton ball to impose ashes on the forehead with the sign of the Cross. We will use individual Q-tips, one swab for each person. The Q-tips will then be burned. This will ensure that the utmost precautions with regard to Covid-19 are followed. Additionally the prayer "Repent and believe in the Gospel" will be prayed once over all who are present and the distribution will take place without any verbal exchange.

Refresher on the Rules of Fast and Abstinence

While Ash Wednesday is not a Holy day of Obligation, meaning you are not obliged to attend Mass, it is a day of Fast and abstinence, as is Good Friday. Additionally, Fridays in Lent are obligatory days of abstinence, or refraining from meat.

For members of the Latin Catholic Church, the norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal. Two smaller meals may also be taken, but not to equal a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding upon members of the Latin Catholic Church from age 14 onwards.

Those that are excused from fast and abstinence outside the age limits include the physically or mentally ill including individuals suffering from chronic illnesses such as diabetes. Also excluded are pregnant or nursing women. In all cases, common sense should prevail, and ill persons should not further jeopardize their health by fasting.

Archdiocese of Detroit

The general obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation (including the anticipatory Mass at 4:00pm or later on the previous day) is to be reinstated in the Archdiocese of Detroit effective Saturday, March 13, 2021.

Considering the grave obligation we have of being physically present with our brothers and sisters at Mass on Sunday and Holy Days of Obligation for the Eucharist, each of us is asked to make a good and sincere judgement as to whether these circumstances apply or not. Where doubt or confusion persists, consult any priest for clarity.



While the general dispensation is removed, there are specific instances where the dispensation will continue, as well as those circumstances where there is no obligation in the first place. One does not have an obligation to attend Mass on Sunday in the following circumstances:

- 1. You are ill or your health condition would be significantly compromised if you were to contract a communicable illness (i.e., you have underlying conditions or are in a high-risk category). *Please use the dispensation and do not attend Mass*.
- 2. You exhibit flu-like symptoms. Please use the dispensation and do not attend Mass.
- 3. You have good reason to think you might be asymptomatic of a contagious illness (e.g., you were in recent contact with someone who tested positive for a contagious illness such as COVID or influenza). *Please use the dispensation and do not attend Mass.*
- 4. You care for the sick, homebound, or infirmed.
- 5. You are pregnant.
- 6. Those 65 years of age or older (per the CDC's recommendation of high-risk individuals).
- 7. You cannot attend Mass through no fault of your own (e.g., no Mass is offered, you are infirmed, or, while wanting to go, you are prevented for some reason you cannot control (e.g., your ride did not show up, the church was at capacity)).
- 8. If you have *significant* fear or anxiety of becoming ill by being at Mass.

For questions about the application of any of these, please contact your pastor / parish priest.

These categories will be reviewed in due course and revised as needed.

Those within categories #1-8 above must still observe the Lord's Day and are encouraged to spend time in prayer on Sunday, meditating on the Lord's passion, death and resurrection; an excellent way to do this is through participating in a broadcast of the Sunday Mass.

God's love for us is patient and kind and all of the above. Let's give thanks for this day that reminds us to celebrate love and what it means to be loved by God. Love and happiness to you all on this Valentine's Day!


