Parish Mission Statement

On the Lenten Journey

+ In the first reading, having saved Noah and all who had been on the ark, God establishes his covenant with Noah and his descendants after him. As a sign of this covenant, God placed the rainbow in the clouds.

Saint Peter says that Jesus suffered for us that He might lead us to God. That's the good news of the Gospel – the doors to salvation in heaven have been opened to us!

Today's Scripture passage about Jesus' 40 days in the desert is from Mark's Gospel, and it is far shorter than that in Matthew or Luke. Mark focuses less on the temptations themselves and ends with the heart of the New Testament message: Jesus says, this is the time of fulfillment. The kingdom of God is at hand. Repent, and believe in the gospel. Jesus' time in the desert was one of preparation for his ministry. We can prepare during Lent for the upcoming Paschal Mystery by thinking of three questions.

First, how have we been saved by God already in our lives? Are there times of trial from which we've been delivered? It's so easy to see only what's in front of us, and the sufferings of the moment. Reflect back on years gone by and actively look for ways that God has delivered us. This should serve to deepen our *trust* in God.

Second, how have we been led to God? How have we been blessed, and saved? What methods of prayer brought us closest to Him? Take those lessons and take advantage of them this Lent. Put them to use this Lent so that we can more clearly listen to what the Lord is saying to us.

And the third question, how might we best follow the Lord into the desert? Perhaps focusing on all the penitential practices of the season might be a way to open our hearts to the Kingdom. The Kingdom, having been rooted in our hearts, enables us to bring it to others.

As we enter this holy season and make efforts to receive Jesus in the Eucharist, let us be open to the graces, blessings and challenges that come – and use them to bring us all ever closer to the Lord!

+I want to thank everyone for their generosity in continuing to support our St. Andrew Parish family! Your stewardship and sharing have helped us stay basically "on track." We've been able to return everyone on staff to their full salary amounts. We are looking to increase our monthly tithing. We continue to receive donations/ pledges to our 2020 CSA (by the way, we have received \$518,613 so far against our target of \$302,657, giving us a potential refund of \$215,956.). Your sacrifices have been most welcomed during this time of pandemic!

Speaking of staff, we have been able to hire a new Christian Service minister/coordinator to fill the position vacated by Sam Jennings. His name is Mr. Drew Peters. He and his family live in the Lake Orion area, but I will let him tell you more about

himself as the weeks of Lent unfold. Drew started with us on Ash Wednesday of this past week. I want to thank Christopher Kasperek and other staff members who have been helping out in various ways during the time of this position being vacant.

- +Last weekend, those of you who use the east entrance to the church encountered some leaks that became apparent due to the snow, cold, and freeze/thaw cycle on the roof over that vestibule. Some patch work was done Sunday afternoon, with further work planned for this past week (but given the snow, I can't say for sure right now how much was done.) In brief, it appears that the problem is stemming from the older roof section over the little lobby space that's in the original church building, as it meets up with the new addition. By the time you are reading this, I hope the issue is resolved.
- +Thanks to all who participated in the Red Cross Blood Drive last Sunday. The Red Cross is in a serious need for donations, so for those who donated (or tried to donate), my gratitude for your efforts! Thanks too to those who helped this past weekend.
- +This weekend we congratulate those individuals on the journey of faith through RCIA as they experience the "Rite of Sending" at Mass this Saturday. This ritual acknowledges their strong desire to complete their entrance into the Church, and they are "sent" to the Cathedral of the Most Blessed Sacrament to express that desire to the Archbishop (or one of his representatives/ auxiliary bishops). I encourage the parish to continue to pray for these individuals, as we all look forward to having them immersed in the sacraments of full initiation at the Easter Vigil!
- +I have not had too many inquiries about the Sunday/Holy Day mass obligation guidelines that were issued last week. We on staff are reviewing what changes (if any) we can make to our schedules, etc., as a result of the new directives. We will keep you posted. But one key point I must make is to remind everyone attending church that you are **required to wear a mask (over the mouth and nose, please!).** If not for yourself, please understand that it is for the benefit of all those around you!

I have asked that the same article be placed in today's bulletin, so you can cut it out and keep it for ready reference. It is quite straight-forward, but should you have any questions, please contact one the priests at the office or after Mass.

+May our Lenten journeys be filled with grace upon grace! Let us remember to pray for one another, and help those in need whenever and wherever it is feasible and safe. May our practices of prayer, fasting and almsgiving help us to grow in our understanding of the things that are truly important in life, and in our faith relationship with the Lord. You have my promise to keep you all in my prayers — I ask that you do the same with me in yours! (Last Tuesday was another infusion day - #5 so far.) God bless you all!

First Sunday in Lent

Baptism and repentance is the common theme in today's Scripture passages. In Genesis, God establishes a covenant with Noah and his descendants: that never again shall all bodily creatures be destroyed by the waters of a flood. St. Peter, in his First Letter, references this story of Noah and the flood. He states: ... Eight in all, were saved through water. This prefigured baptism, which saves you now. The Sacrament of Baptism forgives sin and calls us to discipleship in Christ, our Lord and Savior. Baptism is the "gateway" to all of the sacraments. At the Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday Masses, we strengthen this discipleship by renewing our baptismal promises, vowing to reject Satan, his empty promises, and the glamour of evil in our lives. In St. Mark's Gospel, the

evangelist tells how Jesus *remained in the desert for forty days, tempted by Satan.* We know Jesus was successful in resisting this temptation. May we seek the Lord's grace in times of weakness so we, too, can avoid temptation that leads to sin. During this Lenten season, participate in the Sacrament of Reconciliation to prepare yourself for the Risen Christ.

3 Pillar Thoughts

In keeping with the Lenten practices, here are some possible ideas to consider:

Prayer: Increase or improve your prayer life by beginning a new prayer practice: spend more time reading Sacred Scripture, or consider participating in the Stations of the Cross. Work to build your relationship with God.

Fasting: Be gracious as you continue to follow COVID-19 safety protocols. Fast from complaining about restrictions, and, instead, out of Christian charity, find the joy in serving one another by following safety protocols.

Almsgiving: Call someone you know who is lonely or grieving and give of your time. Make simpler meals, and fill your rice bowl so that others can be fed. Act to serve others and share your blessings.

Archdiocese of Detroit

The general obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation (including the anticipatory Mass at 4:00pm or later on the previous day) is to be reinstated in the Archdiocese of Detroit effective Saturday, March 13, 2021.

Considering the grave obligation we have of being physically present with our brothers and sisters at Mass on Sunday and Holy Days of Obligation for the Eucharist, each of us is asked to make a good and sincere judgement as to whether these circumstances apply or not. Where doubt or confusion persists, consult any priest for clarity.



While the general dispensation is removed, there are specific instances where the dispensation will continue, as well as those circumstances where there is no obligation in the first place. One does not have an obligation to attend Mass on Sunday in the following circumstances:

- 1. You are ill or your health condition would be significantly compromised if you were to contract a communicable illness (i.e., you have underlying conditions or are in a high-risk category). *Please use the dispensation and do not attend Mass*.
- 2. You exhibit flu-like symptoms. Please use the dispensation and do not attend Mass.
- 3. You have good reason to think you might be asymptomatic of a contagious illness (e.g., you were in recent contact with someone who tested positive for a contagious illness such as COVID or influenza). *Please use the dispensation and do not attend Mass.*
- 4. You care for the sick, homebound, or infirmed.
- 5. You are pregnant.
- 6. Those 65 years of age or older (per the CDC's recommendation of high-risk individuals).
- 7. You cannot attend Mass through no fault of your own (e.g., no Mass is offered, you are infirmed, or, while wanting to go, you are prevented for some reason you cannot control (e.g., your ride did not show up, the church was at capacity)).
- 8. If you have significant fear or anxiety of becoming ill by being at Mass.

For questions about the application of any of these, please contact your pastor / parish priest.

These categories will be reviewed in due course and revised as needed.

Those within categories #1-8 above must still observe the Lord's Day and are encouraged to spend time in prayer on Sunday, meditating on the Lord's passion, death and resurrection; an excellent way to do this is through participating in a broadcast of the Sunday Mass.

WELCOME TO LENT...

Lent is a season when we focus on repentance, prayer, and fasting in order to grow closer in our relationship with God. One idea to help your family do that is to create a Lenten Prayer Space...

A **Lenten Prayer Space** starts with a collection of symbolic items in a central place in the home (i.e. on the family table or on a stand in a main living area).

Always included in the prayer space are a candle, a cross, an empty bowl (to represent fasting), a scripture passage and/or prayer, and a Bible. All of these items are placed on a purple cloth. You can also include a poem, a postcard/art or an alms tin as well. As you explore and explain the items, children may ask questions, helping to journey through Lent together. A variety of items, as well as having room for questions and conversation, allows you to meet everyone's needs and understandings.

Candle: Always a symbol of God's presence with us—"We light the candle to remind us that God is with us in this place, at this time."

Purple cloth: For children who travel through advent, the purple of Lent will be familiar as a color for a time of waiting. Use a circle calendar of the church year to show the children that we are in Lent, waiting for the great feast of Easter.

Empty bowl: Explain that we fast so that we have more time or energy to remember to grow in relationship with God during Lent. Maybe encourage everyone to write down something they want to fast from and place the paper in the bowl.

Scripture, **poem**, **or prayer**: This can be written on cards that can be read liturgically (maybe every night at dinner).

Cross: Take time to look at the cross together and talk about the crucifixion and the resurrection.
