On the Easter Journey

†There is a lot of love in our readings today. In the First Letter of John, he writes that *God is love*. This is neither a description of an *attribute* of God, nor an *assertion* that God is just a name for capturing how we feel about things. It is a foundational doctrine that describes who and how God *is*: He is “be-ing.” He is active. God is, in the Holy Trinity of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, a communion of persons united in perfect love. The Holy Trinity is the perfect example of giving and receiving love.

Through that active, continuous outpouring of love, God created the angels, the universe, and us. John again instructs us by stating, *in this is love; not that we have loved God, but that He loved us*. The Lord initiated a loving relationship with us by creating us and calling us into relationship.

Of course, we sinned and damaged that relationship, but our loving God sent prophets and leaders to bring us back. Finally, the Father sent the Son to die for us and show us the perfect love of self-sacrifice. *He loves us and sent his Son as expiation for our sins*.

Like a passionate lover, God pours out abundant love for us, so that we will love in return. If we understand who God is and what He has done for us, the most natural and reasonable response is to love God completely. This is exemplified in our first reading, where Luke tells us that while Peter was speaking to Cornelius, *the Holy Spirit fell upon all who were listening to the word*. These were Gentiles, not beholden to the Mosaic Law, and not waiting for a messiah. Yet they responded to the love poured for them in the preaching of Peter, and glorified God.

To love God completely is to keep his commandments. Jesus says in today's Gospel, *if you keep my commandments, you will remain in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and remain in his love*. The first commandment is to love God with all our heart, all our soul, and all our strength. This requires humility and surrender. We have to be willing to follow the teachings of our Savior and live as his disciples to really demonstrate our love for Him. This is a self-sacrificial love, one where we lay down our lives for one another, whether metaphorically or literally.

This is how we love one another. The Lord expects us to love in a way that sacrifices and suffers for the other. Parents make sacrifices because they love their children. Friends walk with friends through trials and sufferings. Jesus gave us the great example of love in his crucifixion. So, too, are we called to love one another even when it is painful and inconvenient. God is love, and his love at times calls us to the cross.

We must come to see that the love that God calls us to is a love of sacrifice. Are we willing to give it our all? May God's grace help us to do just that!

+**HAPPY MOTHERS DAY** to all our Moms and those who have the responsibility of mothering the children in our world today! May the good Lord reach and bless you in a most special way for all the sacrifices you make! I pray the Holy Spirit watch over, guard and guide you each and every day!

+With all the schedule changes due to the pandemic, we had our parish May crowning this past Friday with some students from Holy Family School. As they joined us at daily mass, the first graders helped us to honor Mary in this special traditional way. May we all remember to honor our Blessed Lady, calling upon her to intercede to her Son for us. Praying the rosary is a good way of doing that!

+This past week, priests and deacons of various Families of Parishes congregated at St. John Vianney Parish for two days to discuss our further involvement and responsibilities in coming together as a “family.” The clergy are to enter into a “covenant” with each other in the family so as to make sure expectations and responsibilities are laid out and determined to avoid conflicts and misunderstandings.

We also are being asked to try to gather our parishioners together to “get to know” one another better; as moderator, I will be working with my cohort and see what we might be able to do, given constraints of the pandemic. Again, we’ll work at keeping you posted as we progress on this journey.

+You know the saying that “when it rains, it pours.”? Well, it seems that has been the case lately around the parish campus. As most are aware, we have been having major phone problems over the last couple weeks. It seems that some of the old connections have given out and are in need of replacement. We are currently looking at the fix, but it will most likely take a few weeks to completely work through the problems. We are now able to have two lines worth of usage simultaneously, but know that at times, that is far from being enough in a big parish complex like ours. You may be delayed in getting through.

Also, we have encountered some additional roof leaks with the old flat roof on the perimeter of the church building (remember, we recently fixed some leaks on the high metal roof of the church building). We are looking at quotes to fix that lower roof, both temporarily as well as a long term fix/replacement project. (sadly, more \$\$\$!). We will keep you posted as decisions are made.

+Remember that Holy Family Regional School will be celebrating their 40th anniversary in a couple weeks with a variety of activities. There will be a big tent going up behind the school the week of May 17th, so please be careful around the campus. That weekend of May 21-23rd will see various activities going on, so drive carefully and park carefully too! We keep the school in our special prayers and thank all those teachers, administrators, and families who support HFRS - making it all possible!

+Thank you for your early contributions to our 2021 CSA “Fuel the Mission.” We have already received pledges/contributions totaling \$126,560 toward our goal of \$347,814, or about 36% of our goal. Know of my special prayers for your generosity!

+I can’t believe that it’s already May! As we continue our faith journey this Easter season, let us continue to pray for one another and for our Family of Parishes in a most special way! May we put into action the love and grace bestowed upon us all! I thank you for your continued prayers for me.....I look forward to seeing you in church!

Sixth Sunday of Easter

In today’s Scripture readings, God’s tremendous love is shown through His outpouring of the gift of the Holy Spirit upon the Gentiles. His love is also evidenced in the wonderful gift of His Son, Jesus, who directs us to *love one another as I love you*. The Lord professes *there is no greater love than this: to lay down one’s life for one’s friends*. Jesus does this by His sacrifice on the Cross. In gratitude for Christ’s sacrifice and abundant blessings, how are we, as faithful stewards, returning this love to Him and our neighbor in need? Please be generous to your parish food pantry or local food organizations. Remember, many children go to bed hungry every night.

Why do we call Mary our mother?

At the beginning of the third session of the Second Vatican Council, Pope Paul VI announced that Mary would be honored under the title “Mother of the Church.”

From Christ’s conception until his death, Mary was united to her Son in his work of salvation. From the Cross, Jesus entrusted his beloved disciple to Mary, telling him to see her as his own mother (Jn 19:27). When the Apostles and disciples gathered to pray after the Ascension of Jesus, Mary was with them praying for the coming of the Holy Spirit. Mary continues to pray before God for the Church and all humanity.

Like Mary, the Church has a maternal role, giving birth to people in Christ. The Church can never cease to look at Mary, who gave birth to Jesus Christ. The Church contemplates Mary’s motherhood in order to fulfill her own calling to be mother of the members of Christ’s Mystical Body, the Church. Also like Mary, the Church is virginal. The description of the Church as virginal is used here in the spiritual sense of the undivided heart and of fidelity in its most luminous form. God calls all the members of the Church to fidelity to the union with him begun at Baptism and continued in the other Sacraments.

In our culture, there can be a discomfort with praying for Mary’s intercession on our behalf. This seems to be a mediating role that crosses a line set out in the First Letter to Timothy: “For there is one God. / There is also one mediator between God and the human race, / Christ Jesus, himself human / who gave himself as a ransom for all” (1 Tm 2:5). So Jesus Christ is the one and only mediator. Jesus alone is the Savior.

But this does not deny the possibility that Christ would permit others to share in his mediating role. Here on earth we routinely ask others for prayers. Instinctively, we turn to holy people for their prayers because they seem nearer to God. Why would we stop asking saints for their prayers after they die? If we believe they are in heaven, would not their prayers be even more effective?

From the earliest times, Christians have sought Mary’s prayers and help. There has been the basic sense on the part of the Church that Mary continues in heaven to be concerned for the growth of all members of the Church into holiness and an intimate relationship with her Son.

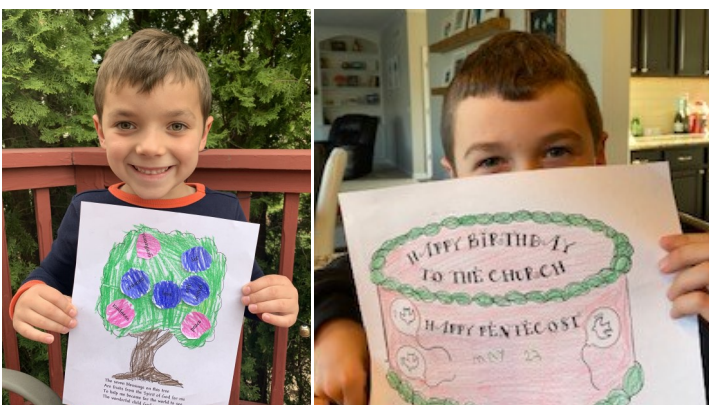

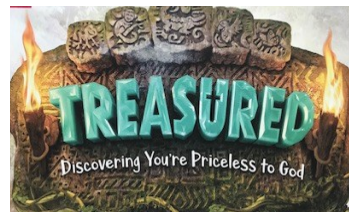

Most of us can admit that we have given our moms their fair share of grief for their rules and advice as we were growing up. How often do we let them know what we truly love and appreciate about them? Mother's Day provides us with the perfect opportunity. Let your mom know all the things you appreciate that she has done for you—even if you didn't show it at the time. You can either tell her in person or write it down for her. Here's some Biblical wisdom that you might want to take to prayer and share with mom this weekend (or anytime, for that matter).

You might want to share these within a card or note and some ideas for how you can tie them into a message for your mom:

- Thank your Mother for her constant example of faithfulness and for raising you in the faith. – Deuteronomy 6:7
- Thank her for the depth of her love. ... 1 Peter 4:8
- This might also be a good time to pledge to be more obedient to your Mother's authority and vow to change behavior, if necessary. ... Ephesians 6:1-3
You might want to point out how the very thought of her fills you with gratitude and joy. ... Philippians 1:3
- Speak about how her example inspires you to live an even holier life. ... Philippians 4:8
- Be specific. List the ways (and examples of times that) your Mother has exemplified love in action. Point to her virtue and affirm her for it. ... Colossians 3:12-17, Galatians 5:22-23, 1 Corinthians 13:4-8, Romans 12:9-18
- Thank her for how her example of love has led you to more deeply understand the love of God the Father. ... 1 John 4:7-8, Ephesians 3:16-19
- You might wish to praise her example of fidelity and womanhood, as wife and mother. ... Proverbs 31:10, 25-30
- Instead of rolling your eyes or getting embarrassed the next time your mom talks about your childhood, thank your mother for giving you so many memorable moments over the years, for remembering them and bringing them up ... even at inopportune times. The fact that she does shows not only that she cares, but how special you are. – Luke 2:19
- Assure her that you will remember all the things she taught you as you go away to school or move forward in your life. ... Proverbs 6:20-22
- Echo the truth that you will praise her and be thanking her for the rest of your life ... that you will seek to parent like her. ... Proverbs 31:2
- If you're looking for one for your grandmother ... or if you've given your mother gray hair – Proverb 17:6

For those who are without their moms on this holiday, offer a prayer to your mom with the same sentiments as if she were still alive.

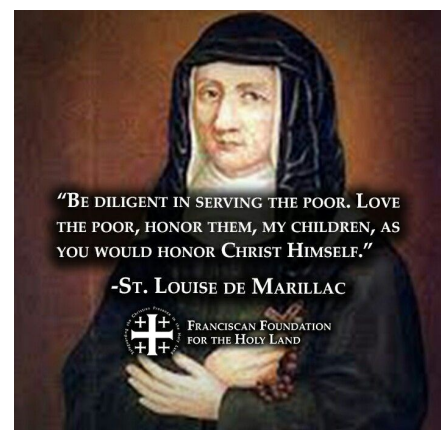
Evangelical Charity = Christian Service
