#### On the Journey

+In today's Gospel, we see Jesus assuming a familiar role as a healer when He makes the deaf man hear. Indeed, Jesus' reputation as a healer is the reason the people bring the deaf man to Him; had their friend needed shoes, or some bread, we can imagine they would have taken him to a cobbler or a baker. But he needs to be healed from his deafness and speech impediment, so they bring him to the Healer.

When Jesus heals the deaf man, He is doing what God had long said He would do since the time of the prophet Isaiah: open the ears of the deaf and make the eyes of the blind see. For anyone who is aware of this prophecy and of Jesus' other healings, this is an example of Jesus "being Jesus" – He is doing what is "typical" of Him.

Jesus' healing of the deaf man may be something typical to us, but we know it was a great surprise to the crowd who were, as the Gospel says, exceedingly astonished. And what about the deaf man himself? We do not know if it was his idea to call for Jesus – if he had faith in this healer or not. All we know is that Jesus took the man away from the crowd, touched his ears, and with a sigh to heaven made him able to hear. Whether the deaf man anticipated his healing or not, this moment changed everything as he received what he needed from the Lord.

This Gospel may not be surprising to us, for we who have heard the other Gospel stories know that Jesus is simply being himself. He is doing the will of the Father, which is to bring healing. Yet if our familiarity with Jesus' healing power compromises our awe at this goodness, then we are in exactly the same position as the deaf man at the story's beginning. If we are not only unsurprised but also unmoved by this story, then we, too, are in need of being restored to right relationship with God, and we need healing to hear his voice again. The healed heart not only hears that Jesus is the healer, but runs to Him and begs for the help we need, that our families and friends need, that our world needs.

Thankfully, part of Jesus' mission – his being who He is – is to come to heal the deaf in body as well as restoring us to right relationship with God. He comes for us, whether we know how much we need Him or not, and He longs to give us what we need. The Lord's groans to heaven are for us – for you and for me – to be open to receive all we need from Him.

As we come before the Lord – especially at the time of celebration of the Eucharist – let us seek what we truly need. Our God is the God of healing, forever worthy of our thanks and praise for all the many blessings bestowed upon us all!

+Happy Labor Day weekend to everyone! We thank the Lord for the blessings of labor and the good that comes about from our efforts. May we always direct those efforts toward not just the good of ourselves, for the benefit of our community and society in general. Enjoy the holiday and remember to keep safe in whatever you are

involved! Remember that Mass on Monday is at the normal 9 a.m. time; offices will be closed for the holiday, re-opening Tuesday for normal business activities.

+Back in 2015, the Catholic Church joined together with the Orthodox Church in recognizing and celebrating the "Season of Creation" – coming together to pray and work for the world that God has entrusted to us for our journey through time. It is a time when hopefully we grow in a deeper appreciation for this planet of ours, and the need for all of us to take action in caring for it. 



#### Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults and Children

#### How does one become Catholic?

Many Catholics are born into Catholic families and gradually come to share in the full Sacramental life of the Church. Others, previously baptized in other Christian Churches or never baptized, become Catholic through a process known as The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults. Children over the age of seven participate in a modified process, The Rite of Christian Initiation of Children. The Rites of Initiation of adults and children are the Catholic Church's way of initiating new members. At St. Andrew Parish we warmly welcome new members and attempt to provide an appropriate spiritual formation for each inquirer.

#### Who may participate?

Those never baptized as Christians. Those baptized in another Christian faith tradition now interested in the Catholic tradition. Those baptized in the Catholic tradition whose sacramental reception is not complete. Children over the age of seven who have not received the Sacraments of Baptism, First Eucharist or Confirmation.

#### How long is the process?

RCIA is not a class or a program but a process of conversion. It prepares one to embark on a journey of faith that leads to a lifelong commitment as a Catholic. All Catholics are called to daily conversion and renewal of our faith journey. RCIA stresses the need for a living experience of Church as a "people of God" and not just "knowledge" about the Church. A person's desire to turn toward God (conversion) and become connected to a community does not happen instantaneously, but takes time as the Holy Spirit nurtures the deepening desire within. The usual length of preparation is approximately nine months to a year. In most cases, the initiation of new members is celebrated at the Easter Vigil.


#### St. Isidore the Laborer



All calls regarding complaints of sexual abuse will be returned in a timely This toll-free telephone number has been established as part of an effort by the Detroit archdiocese to protect children, young people, and other vulnerable people in our schools, parishes, and ministries. This line is for reporting suspected sexual misconduct or child abuse within archdiocesan institutions and ministries only.
